COST OF LIVING IN THE YEAR ENDING 1917

REQUIREMENTS.—1. The family must be that of a wage-earner or salaried worker, but not of a person in business for himself. The families taken should represent proportionally the wage-earners and the low or medium salaried families of the locality, both as between these two occupational classes and as between income groups. Take no family of a salaried worker earning above \$2,000, there is no limit as to a wage earner. 2. The family must have as a minimum both a husband and wife and at least one child who is not a boarder or lodger. 3. The family must have kept house in the locality for the entire year covered. 4. At least seventy-five per cent of the family income must come from the principal breadwinner or others who contribute all earnings to family fund. 5. All items of income or expenditure of members other than those living as boarders or lodgers must be obtainable. 6. The family may not have over three boarders or lodgers either outsiders or children living as such. 7. The family must have no subrental other than furnished rooms for lodgers. 8. Do not take alms or charity families or non-English speaking families who have been less than five years in the United States. Also see instructions.
