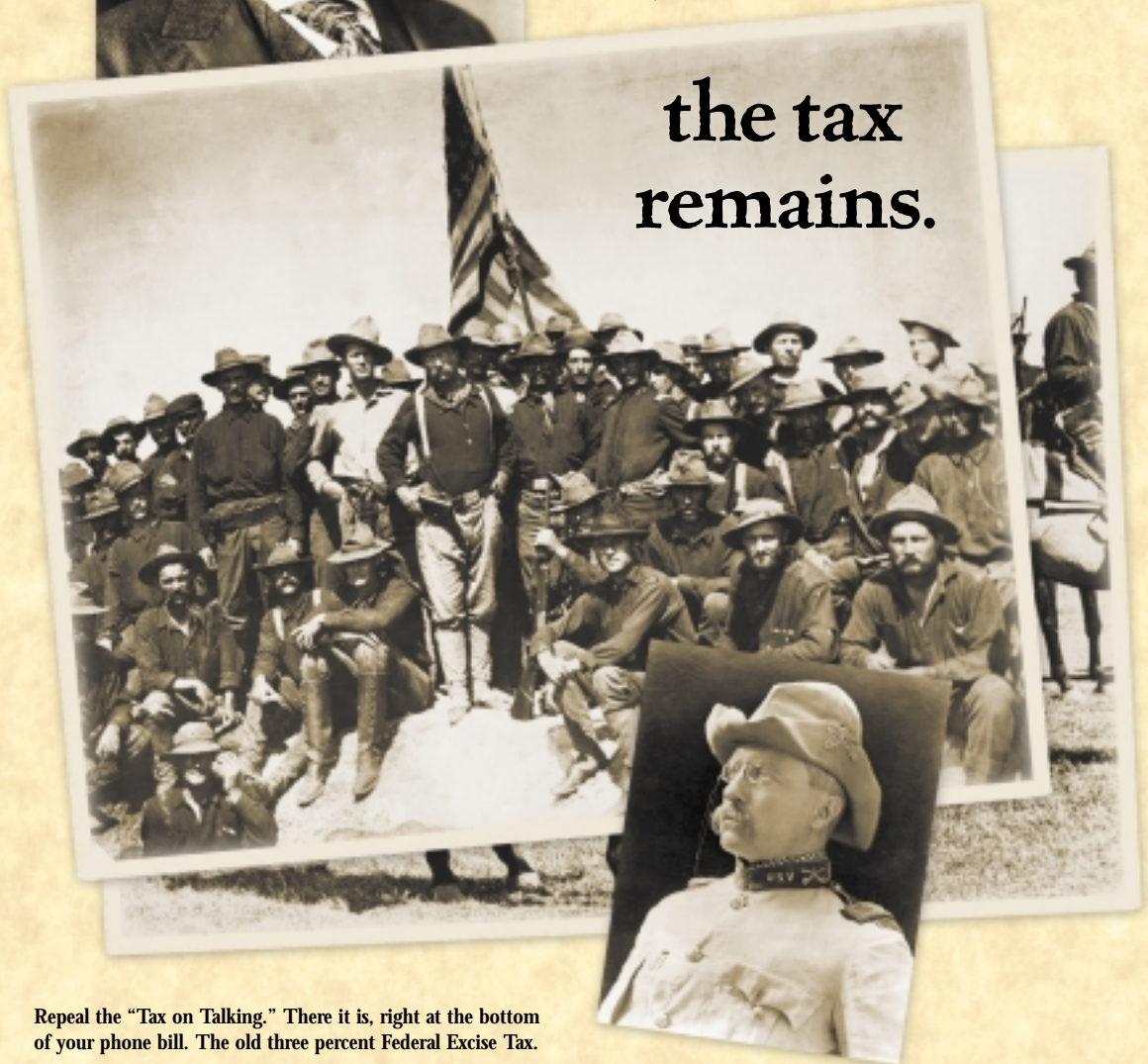




The Spanish-American War is over —

It's a tax on telephone service that was "temporarily" instituted in 1898 to help pay for the Spanish-American War. The war is paid for, the tax remains.

In 1898, telephone service was a luxury, so the tax affected only the richest Americans. Today, the "Tax on Talking" isn't just on regular telephone service, but includes cellular service and access to the Internet. Everyone pays the tax — with the heaviest burden on low and fixed income Americans, who spend a larger percentage of their incomes to pay the tax.

Repealing the "Tax on Talking" will lower phone bills and save the average family up to \$50 per year. It's time to end the longest "temporary" tax in American history.
