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FASEB Responds to Report of the President's Council on Bioethics

Bethesda, MD — In response to a report released today by the President's Council on Bioethics, FASEB President Steven L. Teitelbaum, M.D., restated FASEB's opposition to a moratorium on somatic cell nuclear transfer. A four year moratorium is one of the recommendations in the report, "Human Cloning and Human Dignity: An Ethical Inquiry." Seven members of the Council, however, opposed this recommendation. There is no scientific basis for a moratorium, and preventing this research from going forward will only delay potential cures and treatments for many diseases. "The National Academy of Sciences and many other experts have examined this issue carefully and recommended that this vital research progress under appropriate guidelines. We concur with their conclusions and believe it is imperative that there be no delay," stated Dr. Teitelbaum. The second recommendation of the Council's report, that cloning for reproductive purposes be banned but that cloned embryos be allowed for research purposes, is in line with FASEB's position on human cloning.
