# COST OF LIVING IN THE YEAR ENDING 1917

REQUIREMENTS.—1. The family must be that of a wage-carper or malaried worker, but not of a person in business for himself. The families taken should represent proportionally the wage-carpers and the low or medium salaried families of the locality, both as between these two occupational classes and as between income groups. Take no family of a salaried worker carping above \$2,000, there is no limit as to a wage carper. 2. The family must have as a minimum both a husband and wife and at least one child who is not a boarder or lodger. 3. The family must have kets house in the locality for the entire year covered. 4. At least seventy-five per cent of the family income must come from the principal breadwinner or others who contribute all carpings to family fund. 5. All items of income or expenditure of members other than those living as boarders or lodgers must be obtainable. 6. The family may not have over three boarders or lodgers either outsiders or children families who have been less than five years in the United States. Also see instructions.
