I don't know if you attempted to seek me out at the APSA convention in Chicago, and I am sorry I was not at the booth at the time if you did. But I just want to tell you that I received your letter of August 7 before the convention and brought it with me to discuss with you there.

Although I admire your efforts to revise your dissertation with an eye to expanding its potential audience, I am afraid I remain skeptical about attracting a sufficient number of buyers to make its publication economically feasible, and I also still think that the best way of presenting the most important findings of your study is to publish some more articles.

I am sorry I cannot be more sanguine about the prospects for publishing this kind of book, but of course you should not take my word for gospel. Certainly you should try out your prospectus on several other university press editors in this country, and perhaps also you should look into the possibility of bringing your book out in France. Maybe PUF would be interested?
