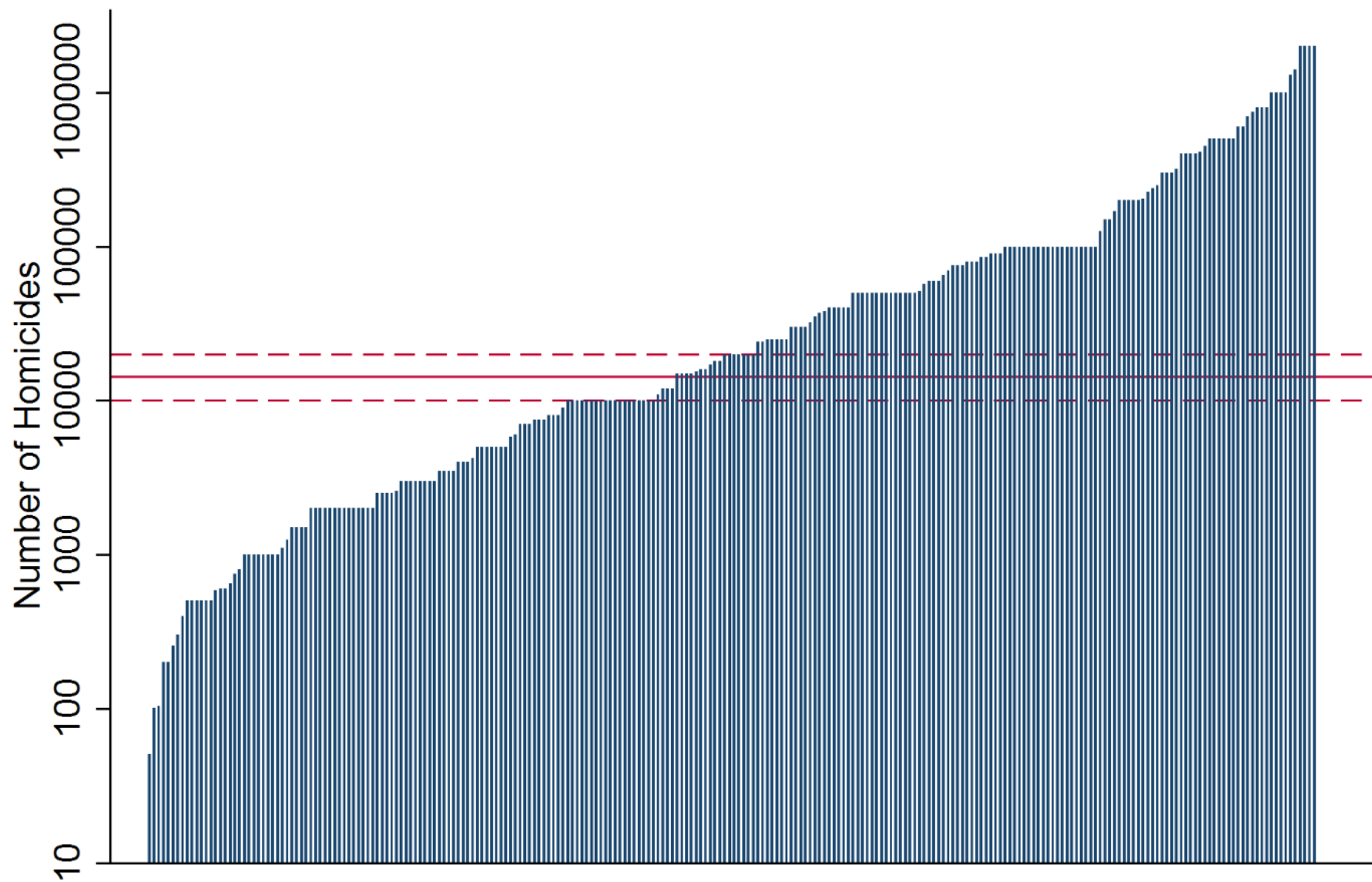

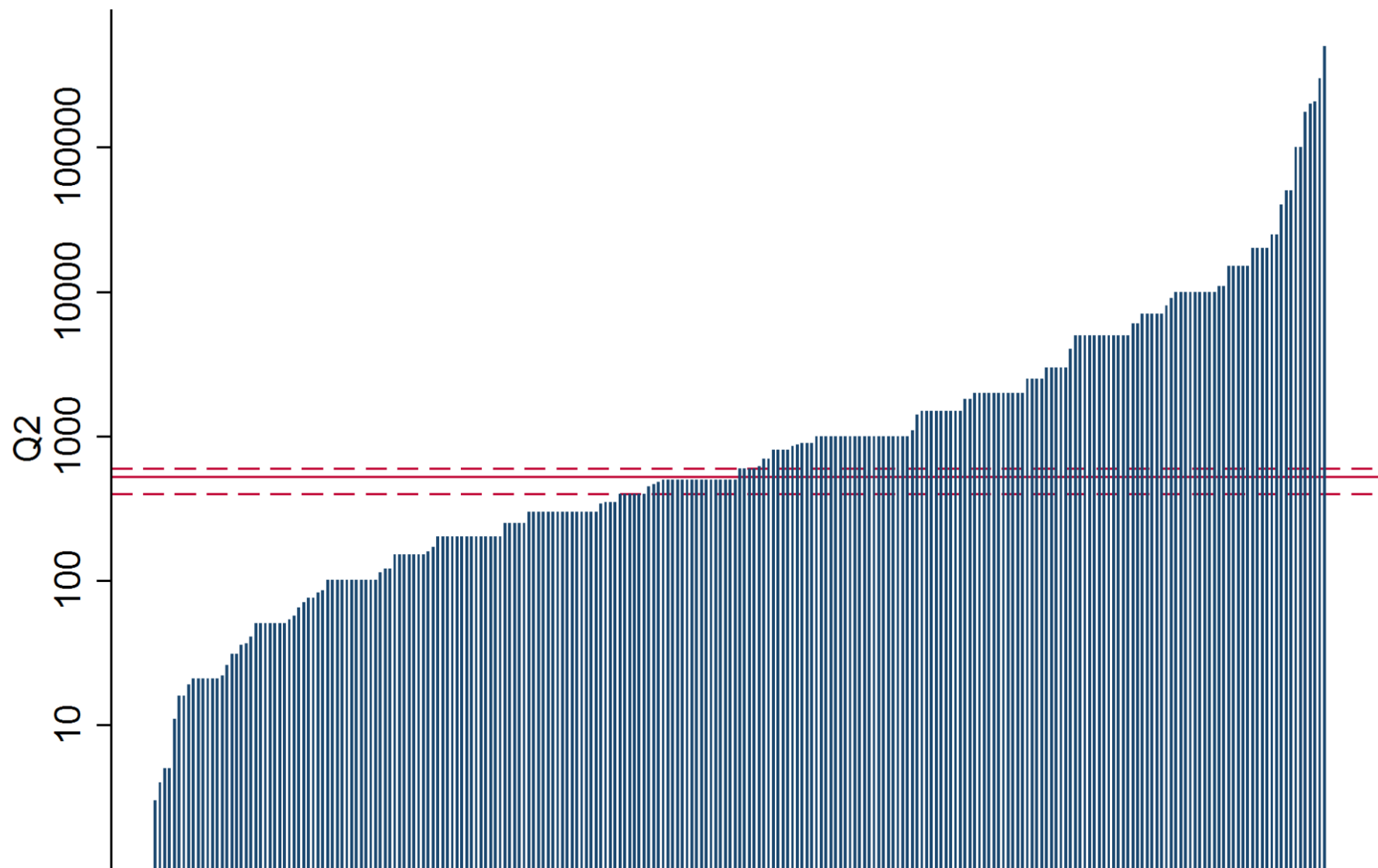
Q1: Number of Homicides - 2014

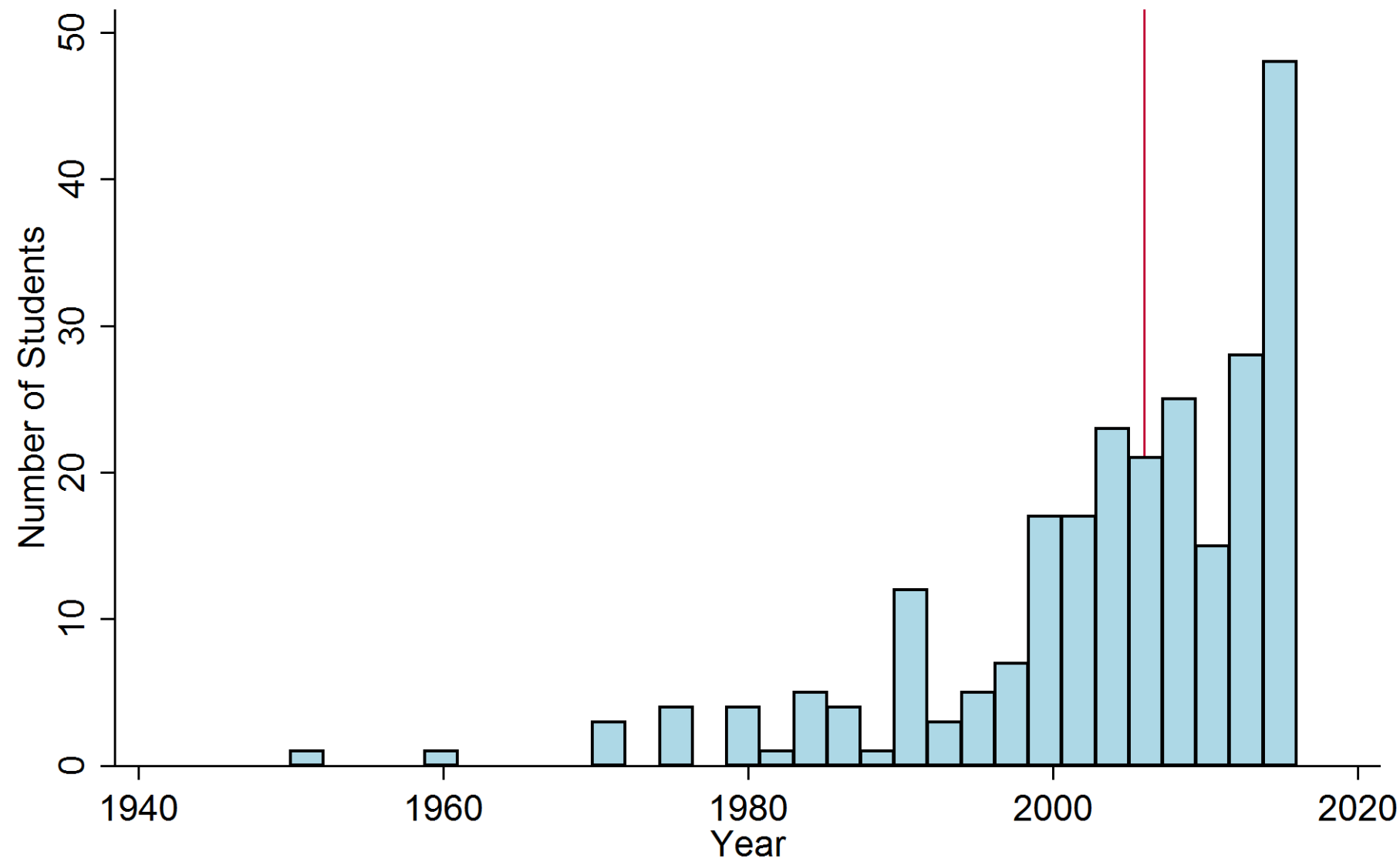
2: Number of Homicides in NC - 2014

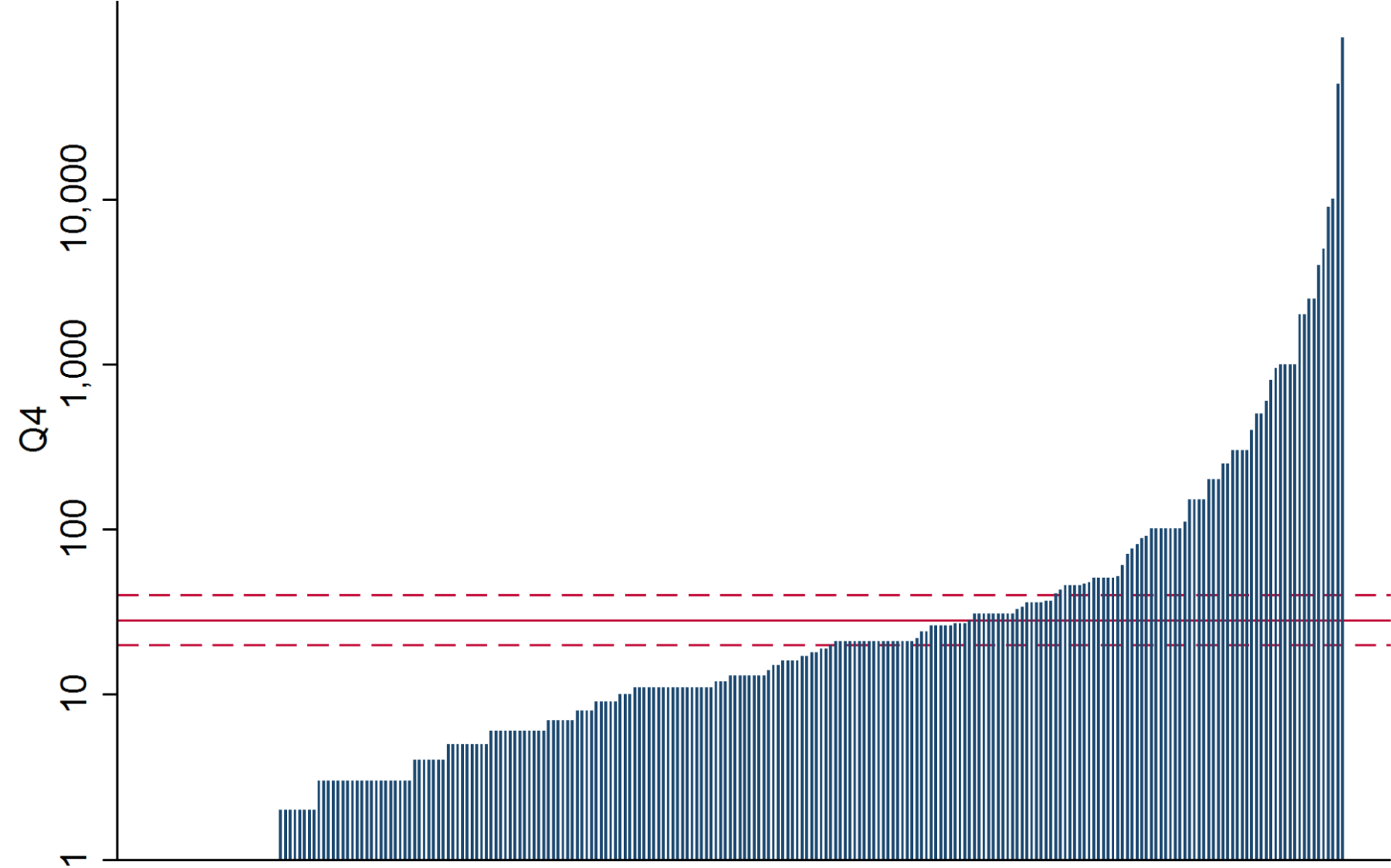
Q3: Most Recent Execution in North Carolina

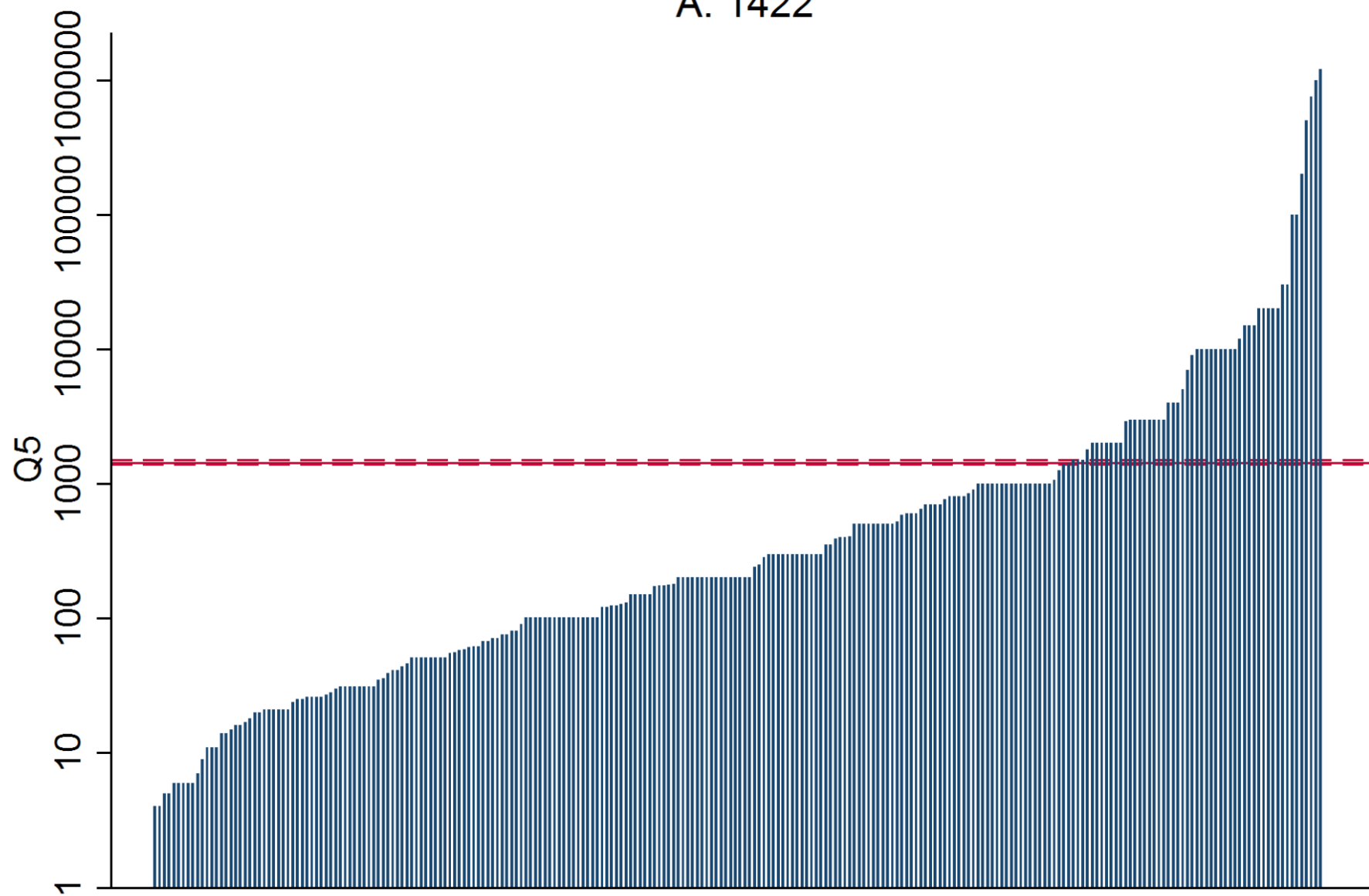

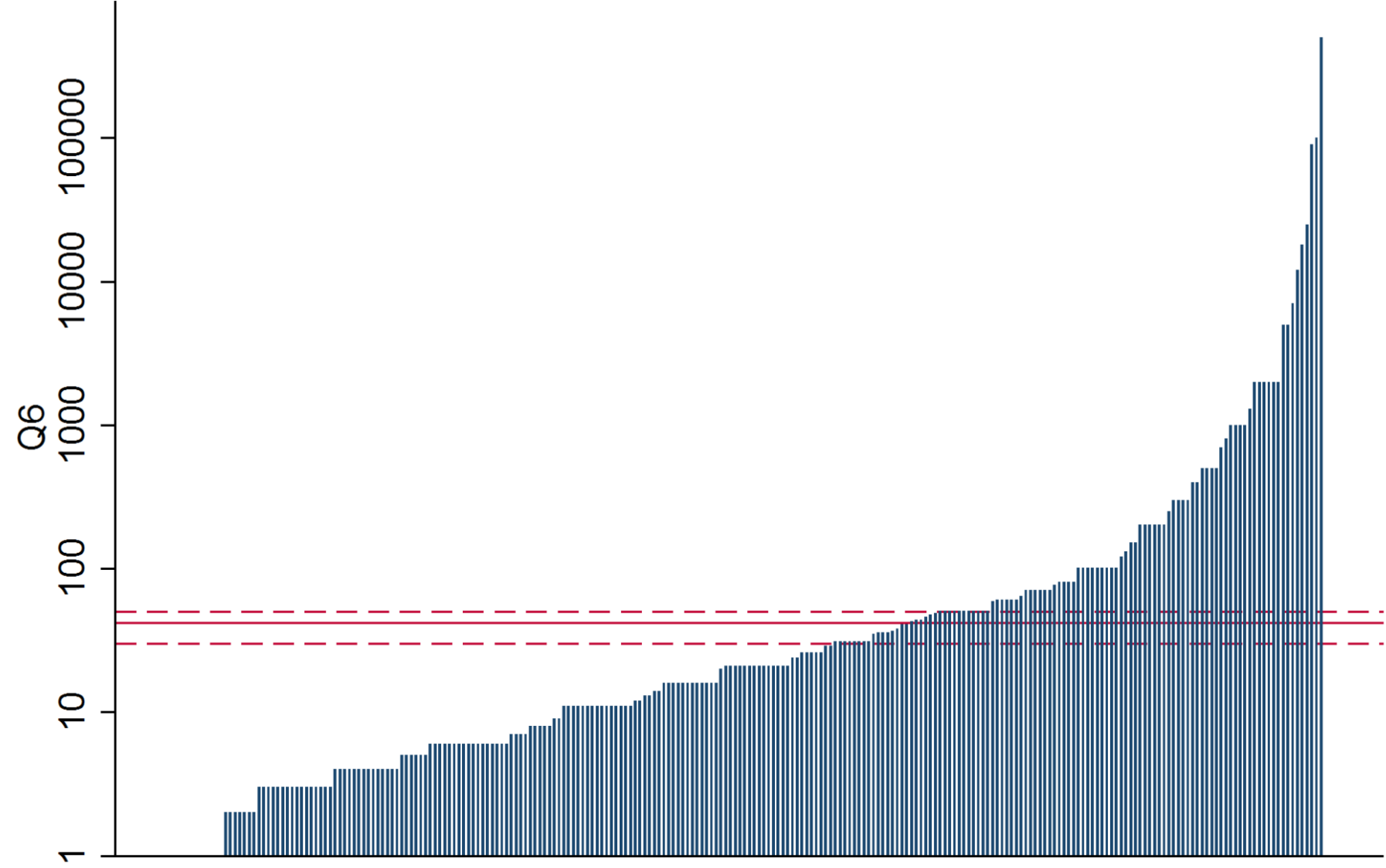

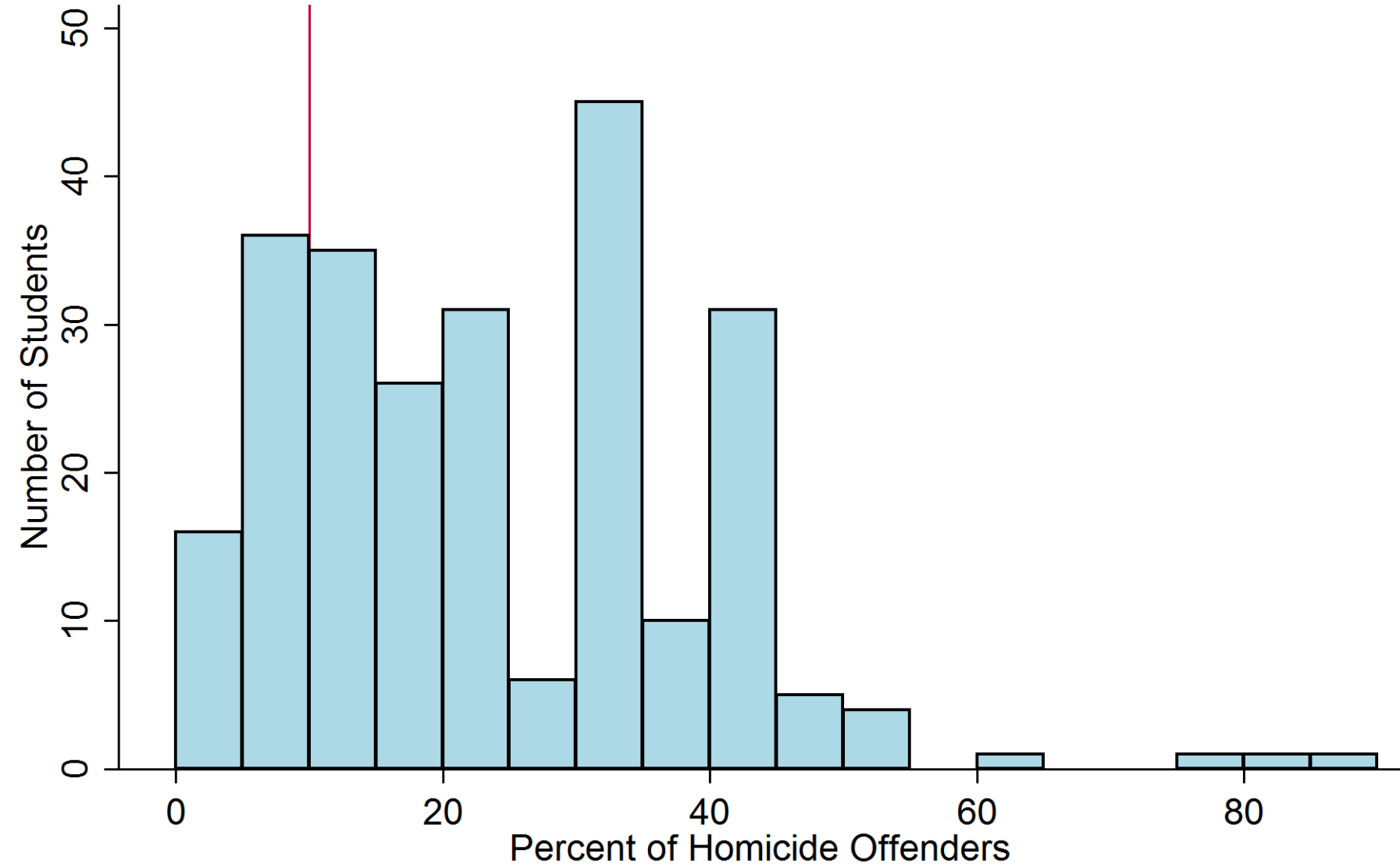

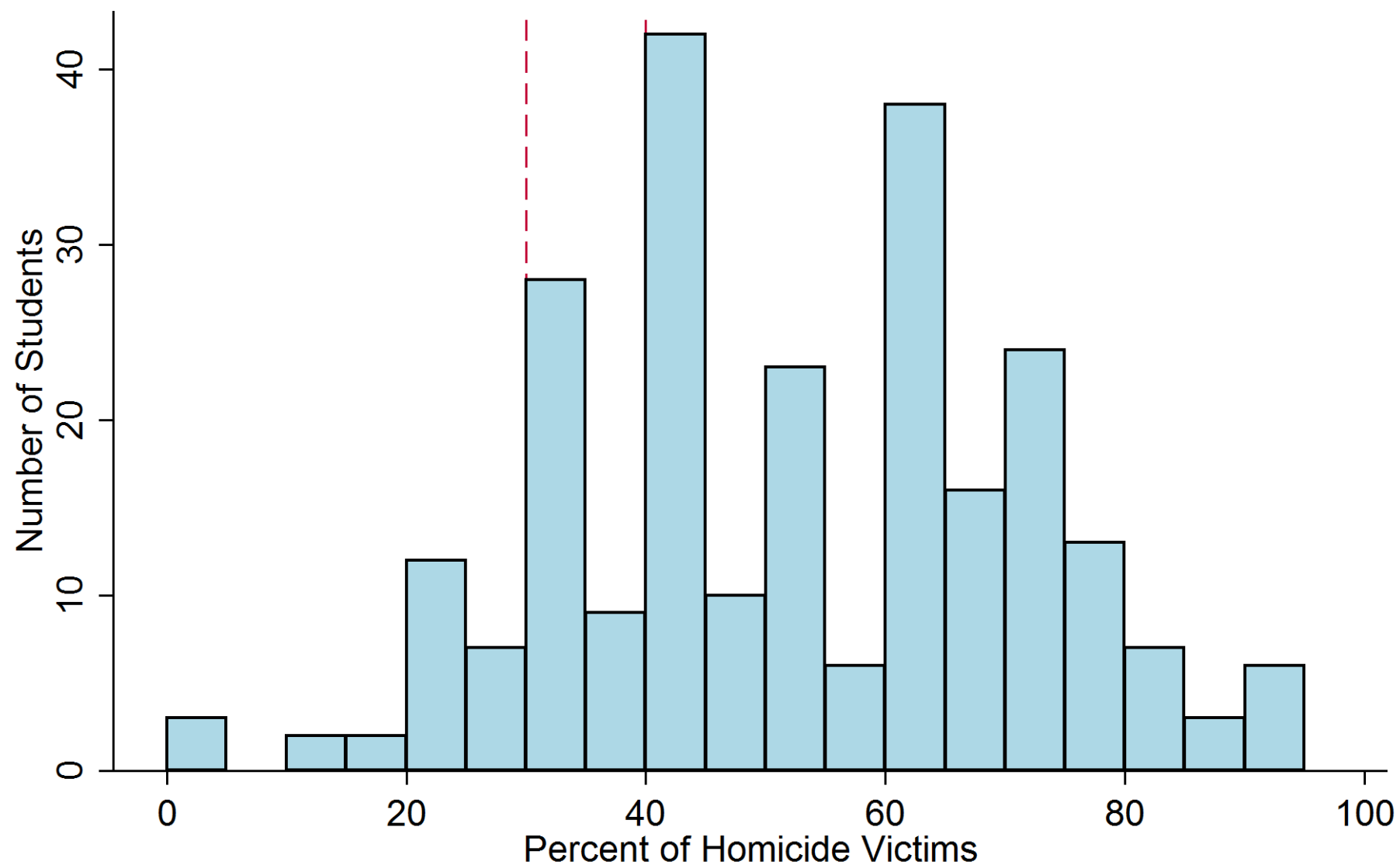

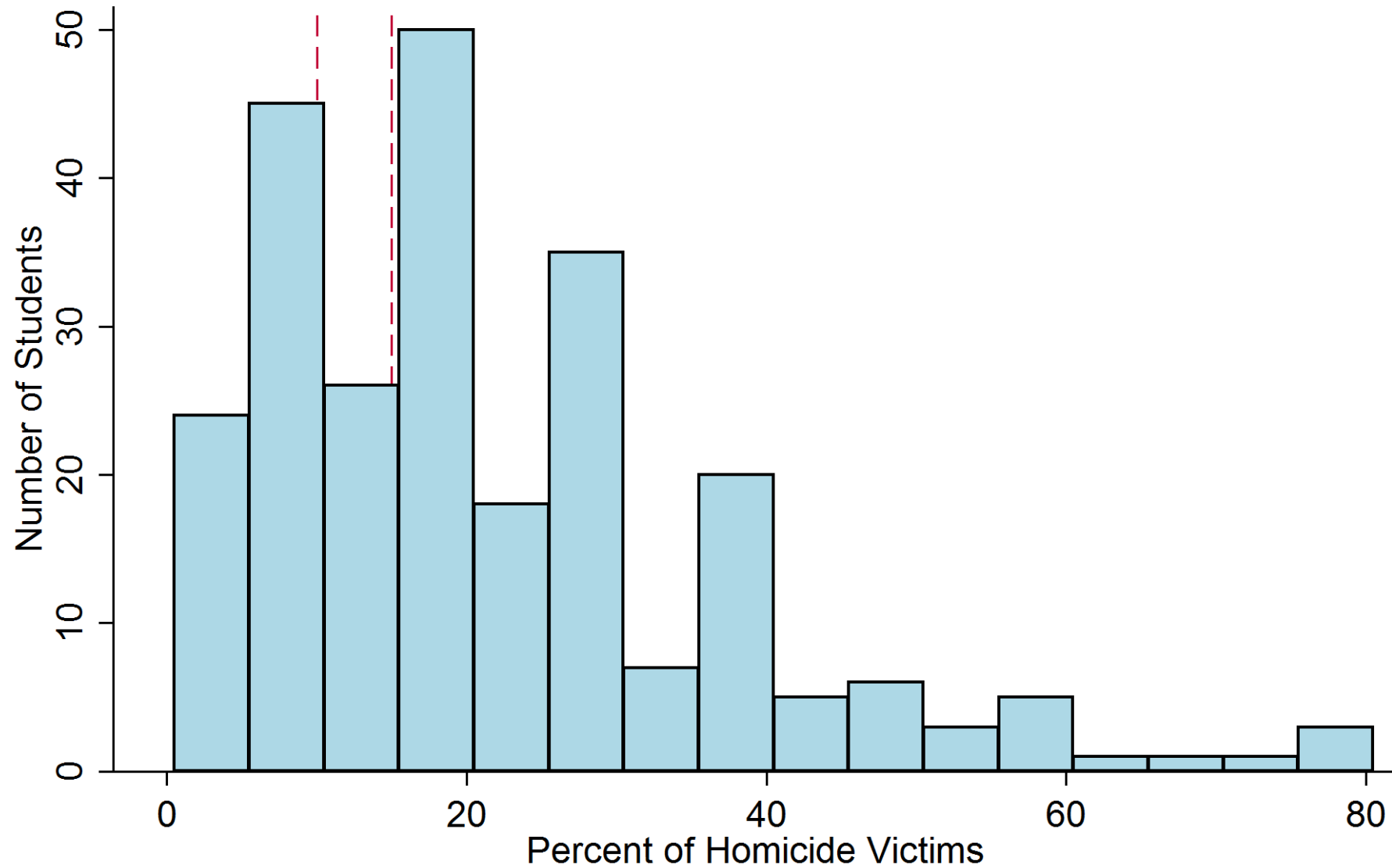

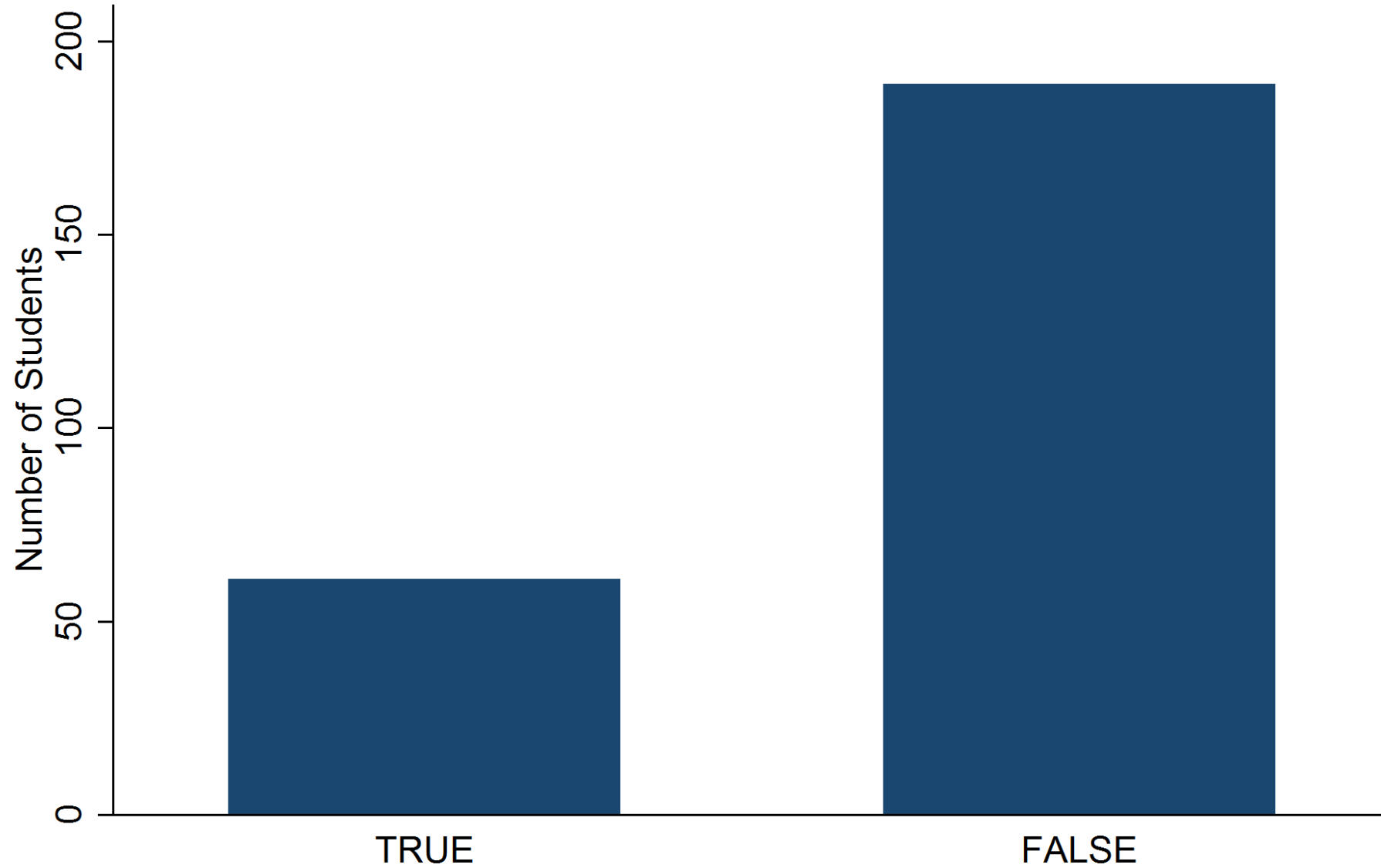

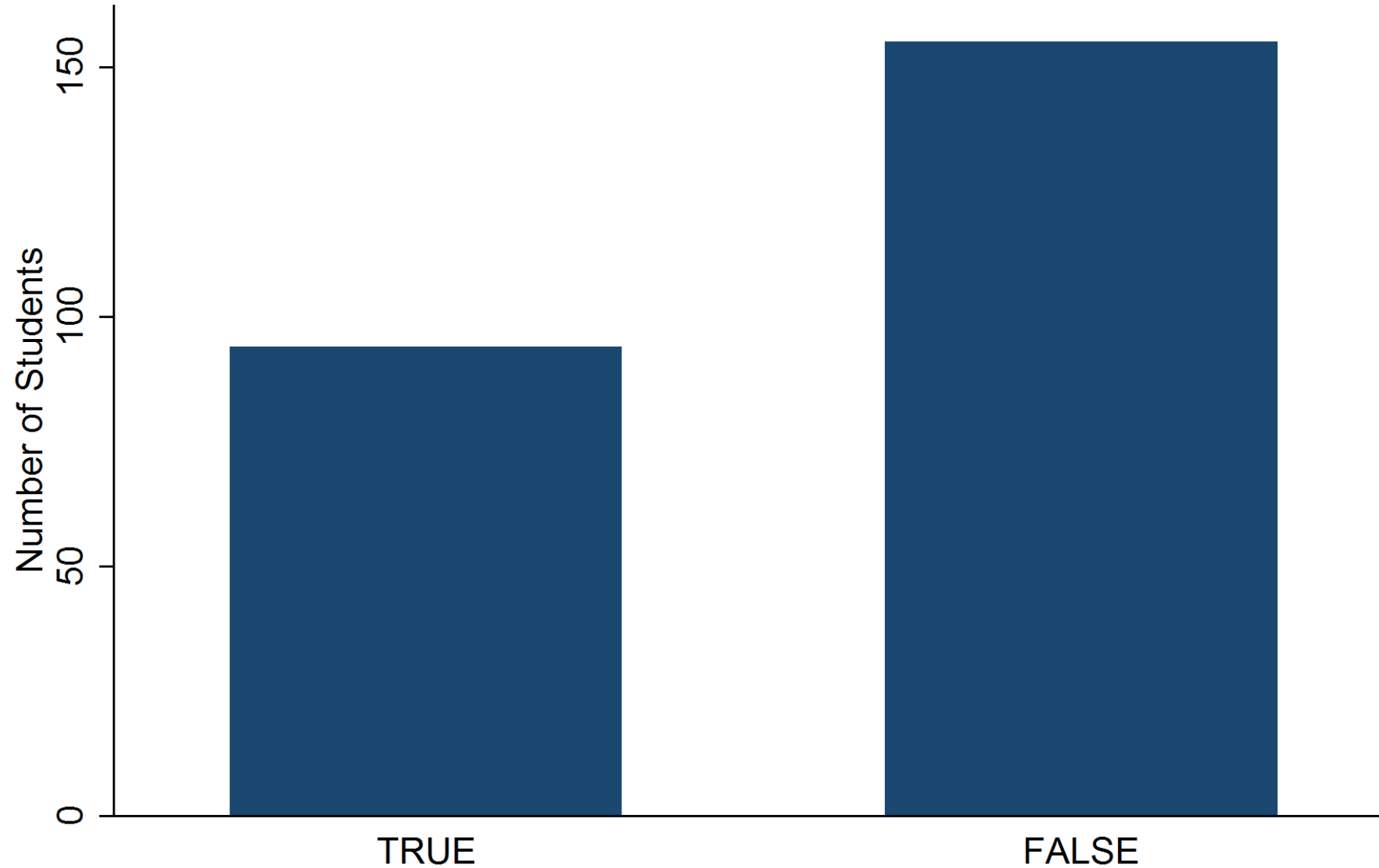

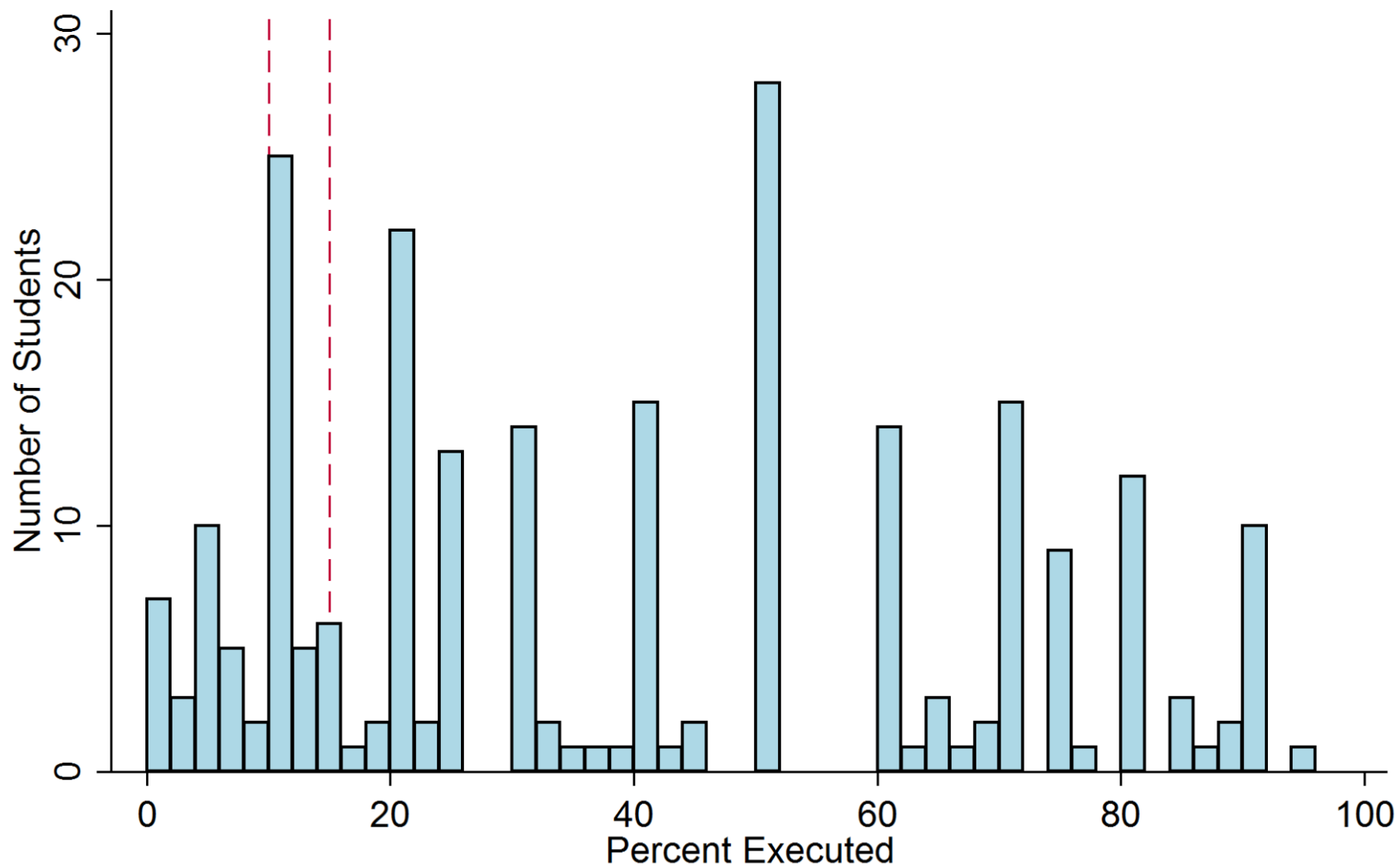

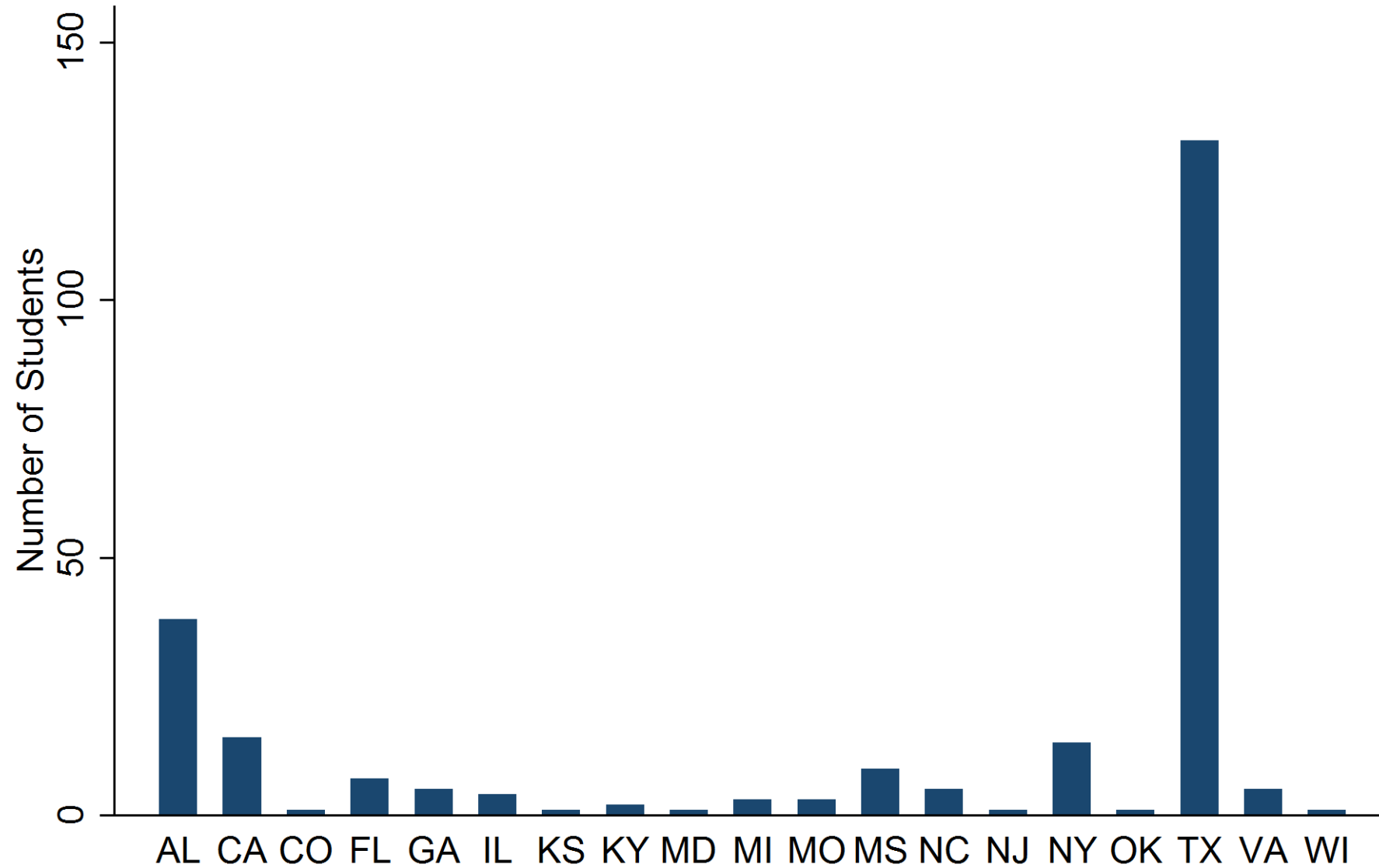

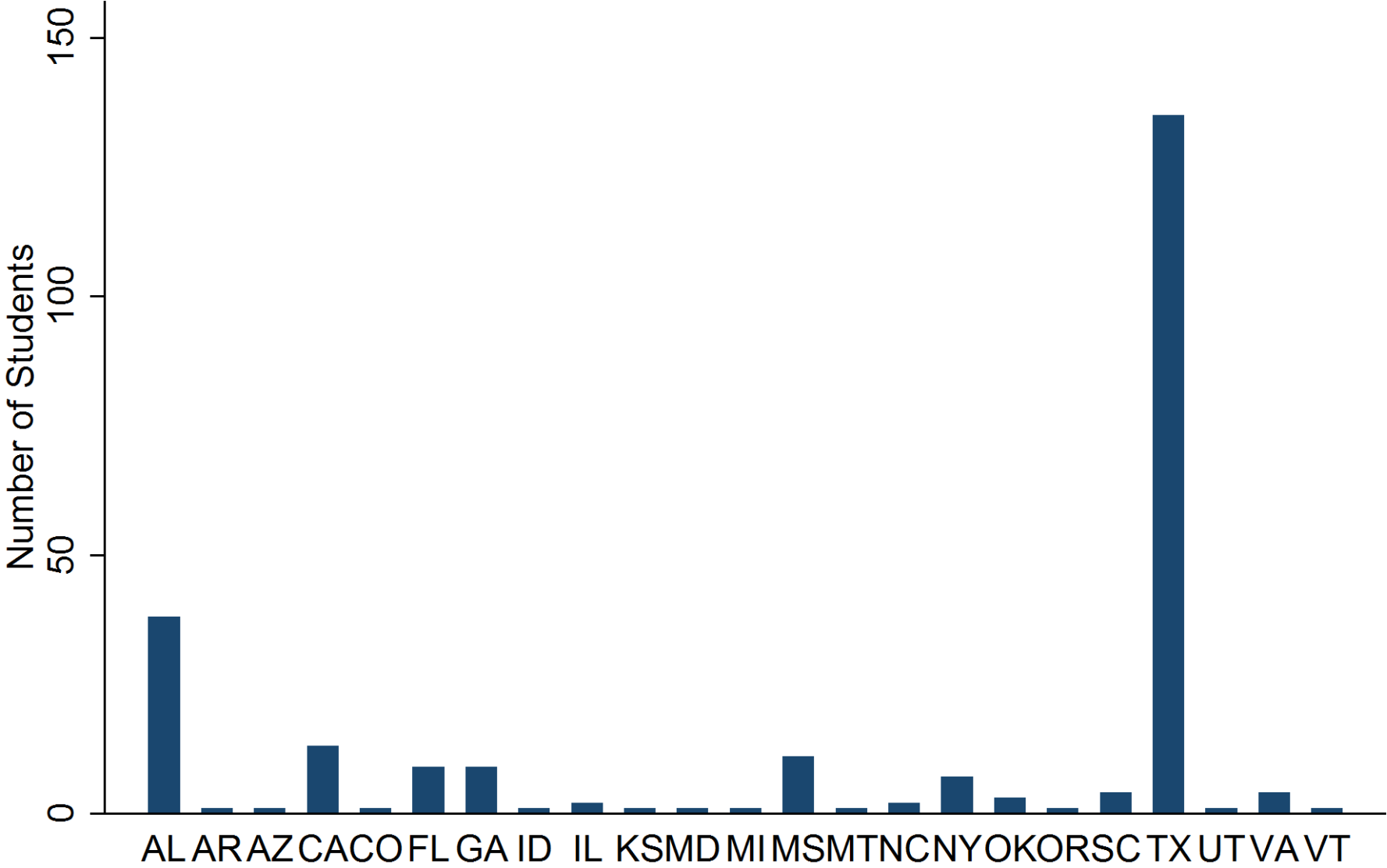

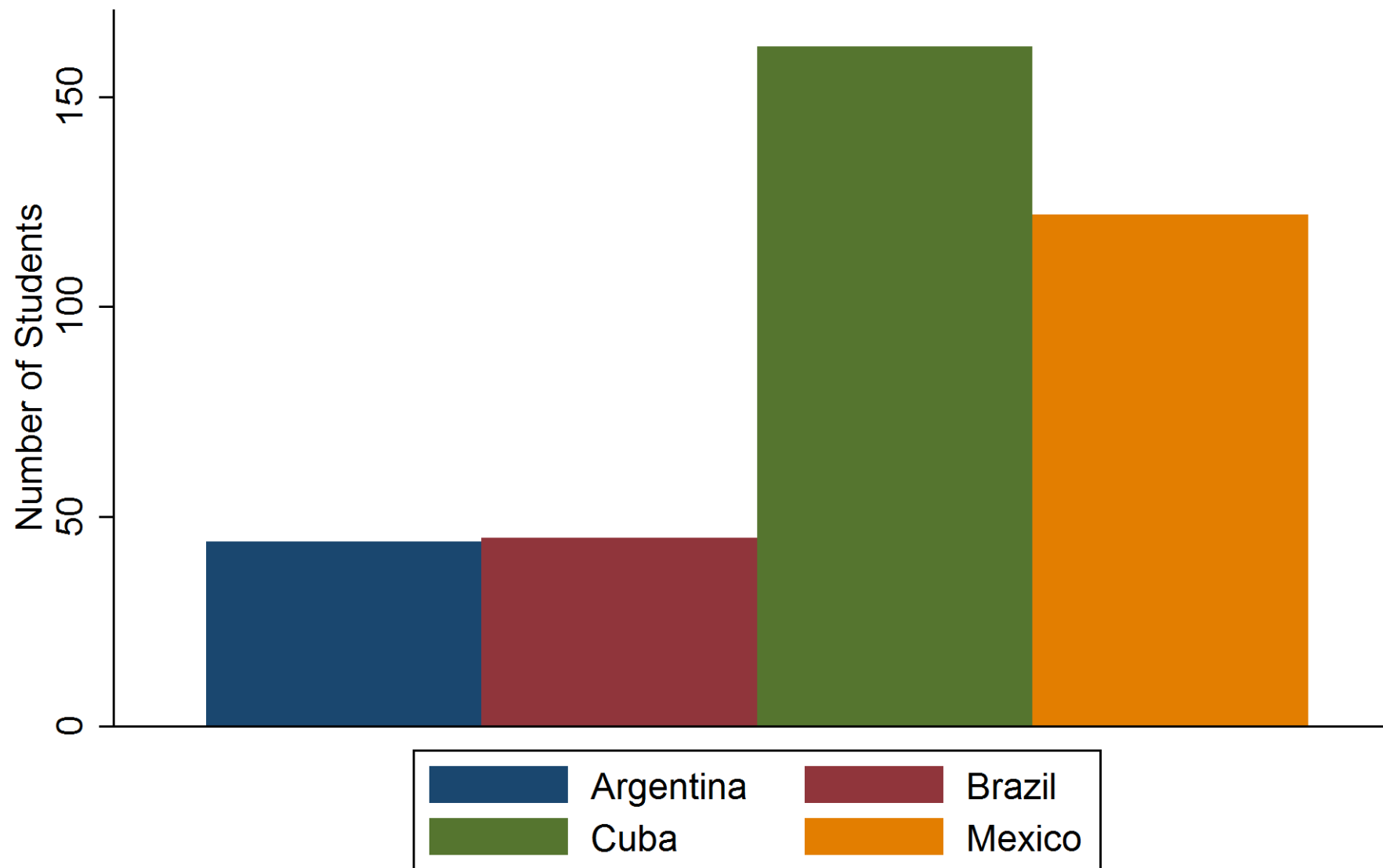

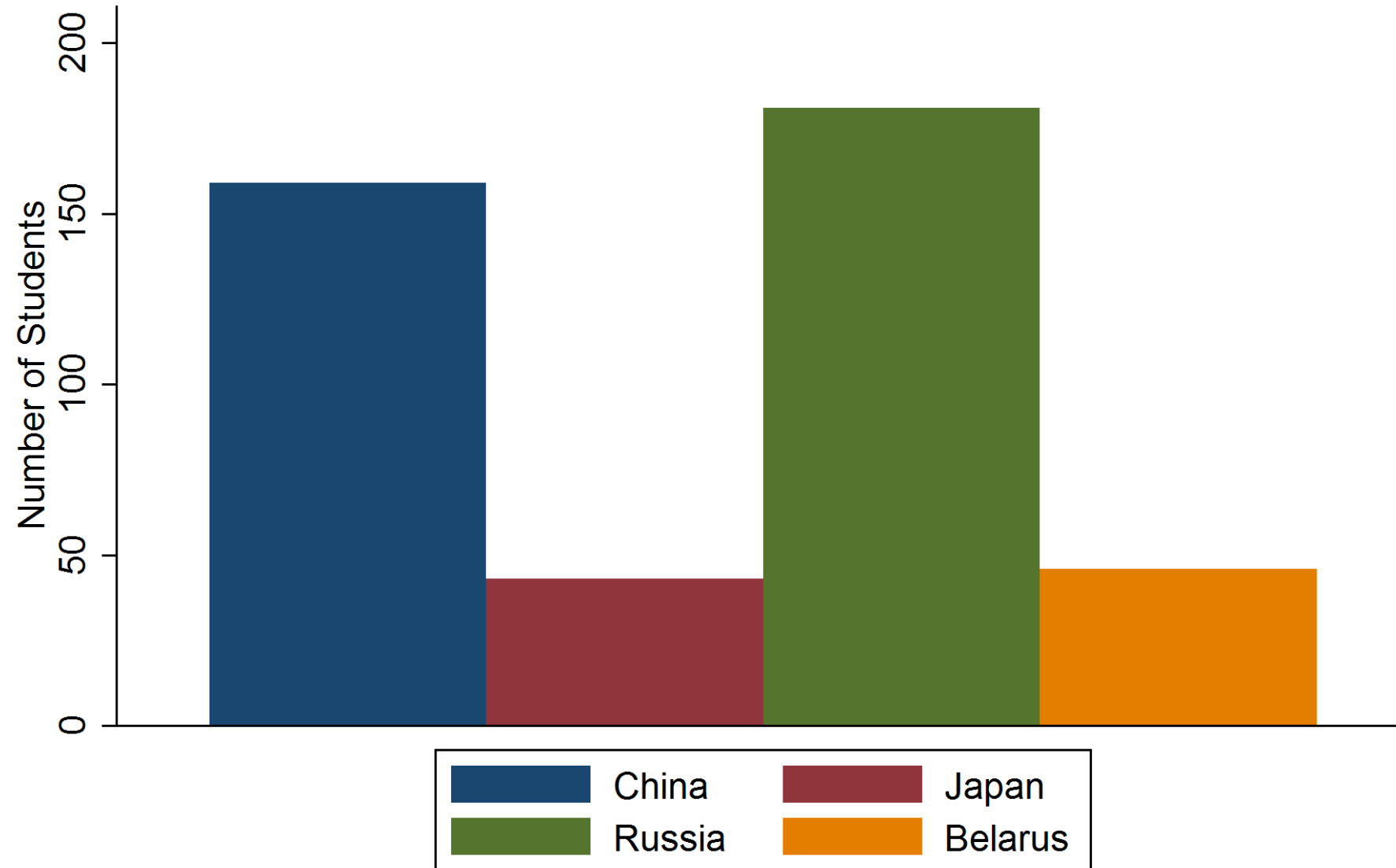

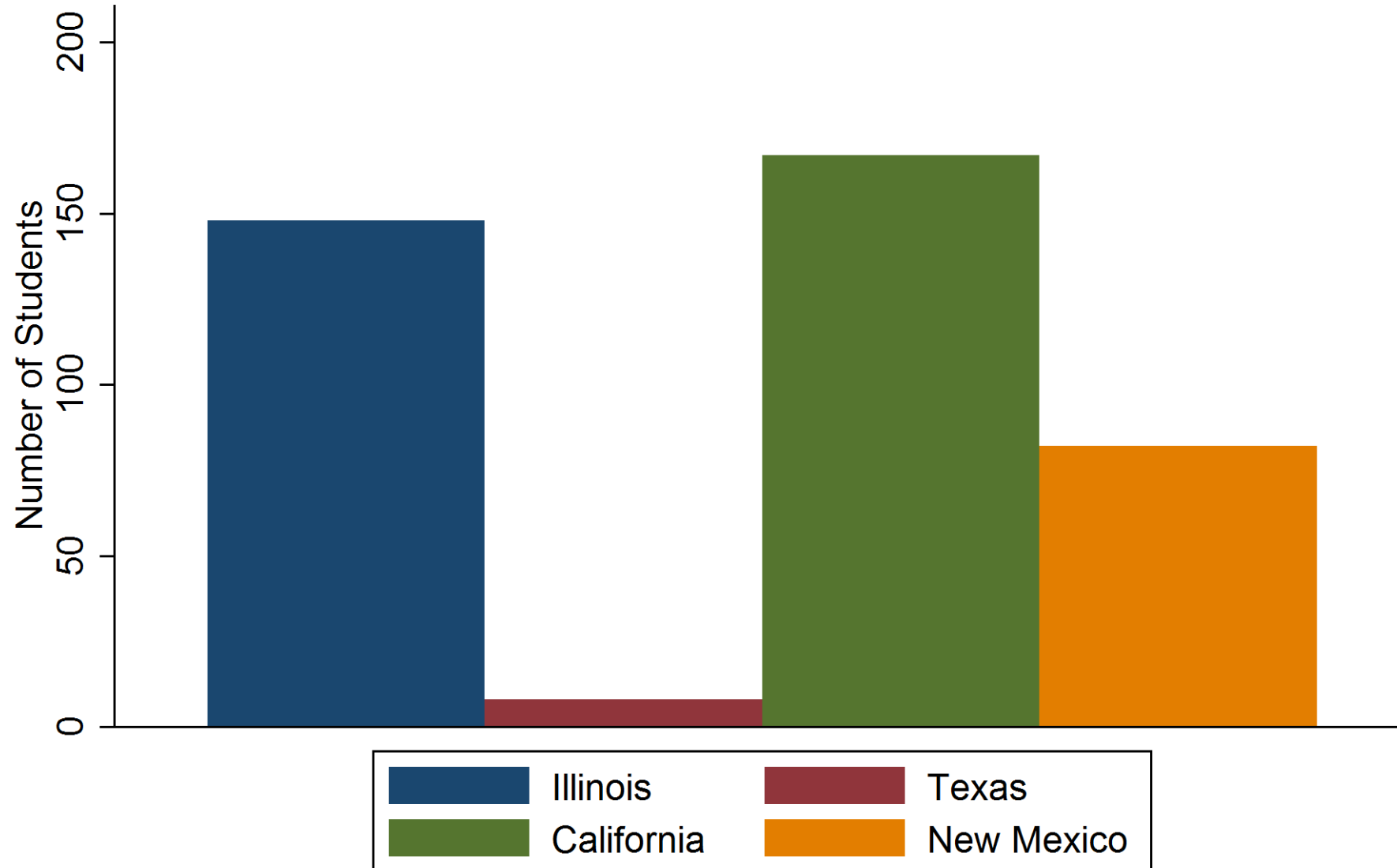

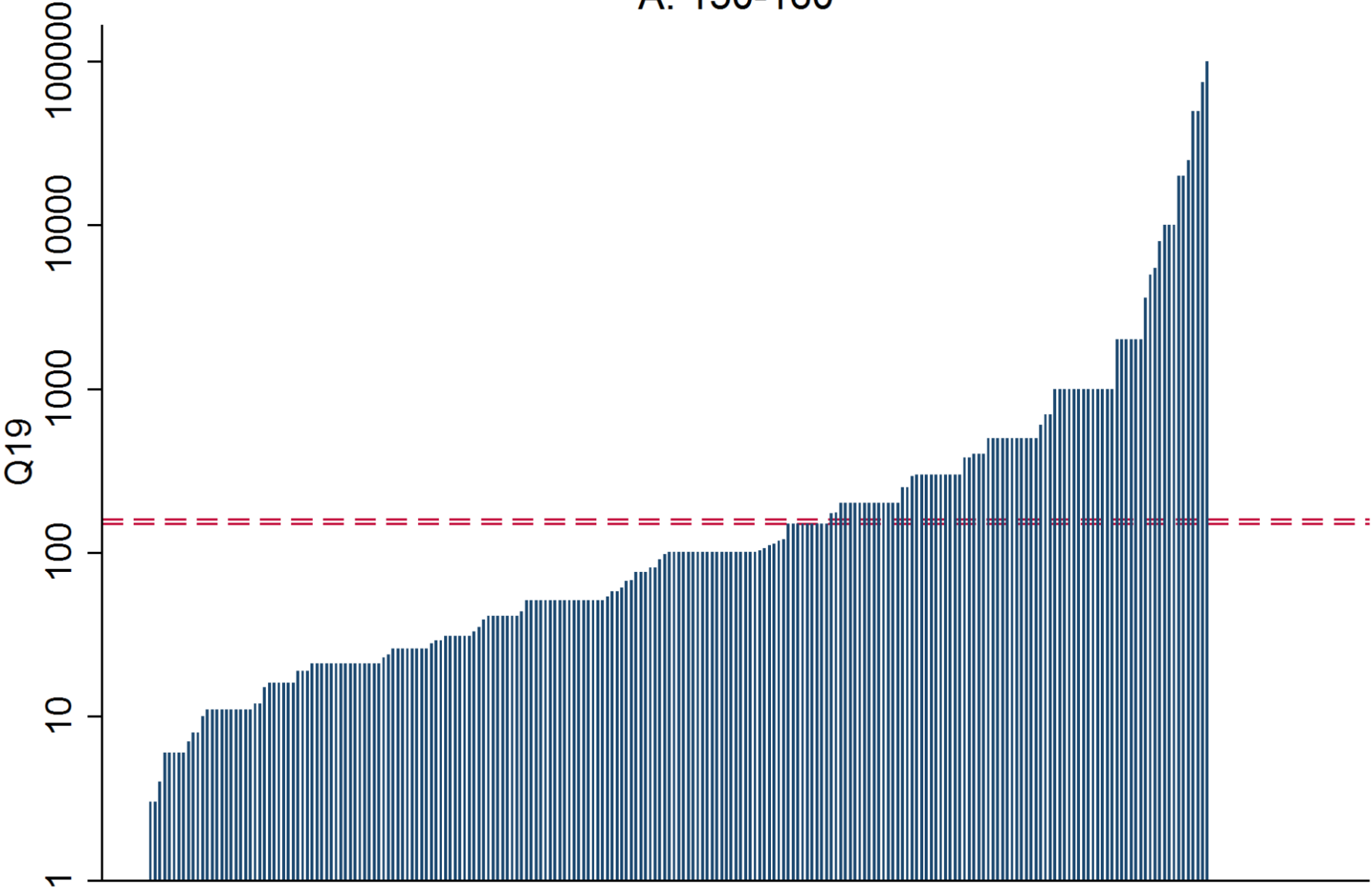

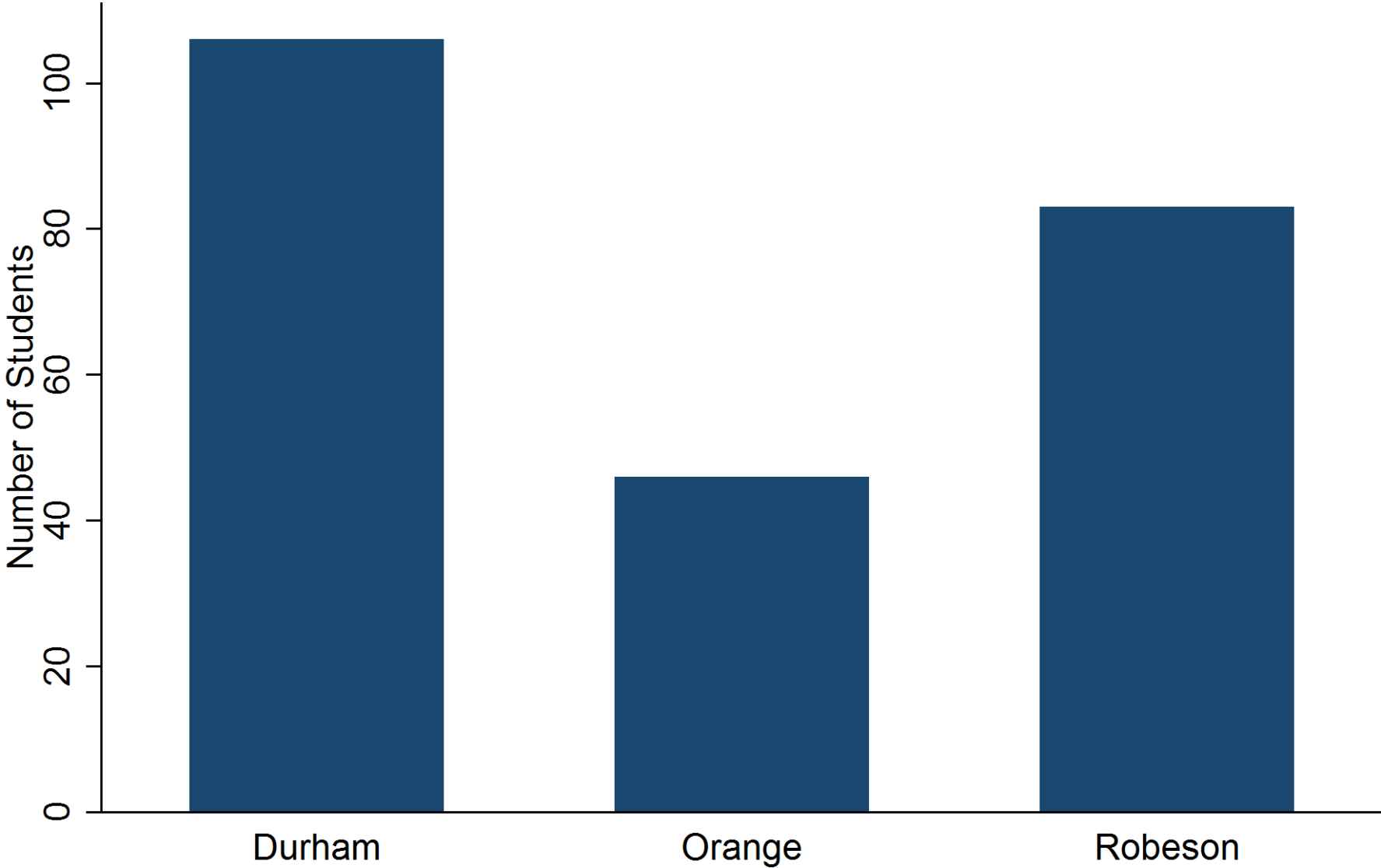
Q19: Number of Exonerees from Death Row

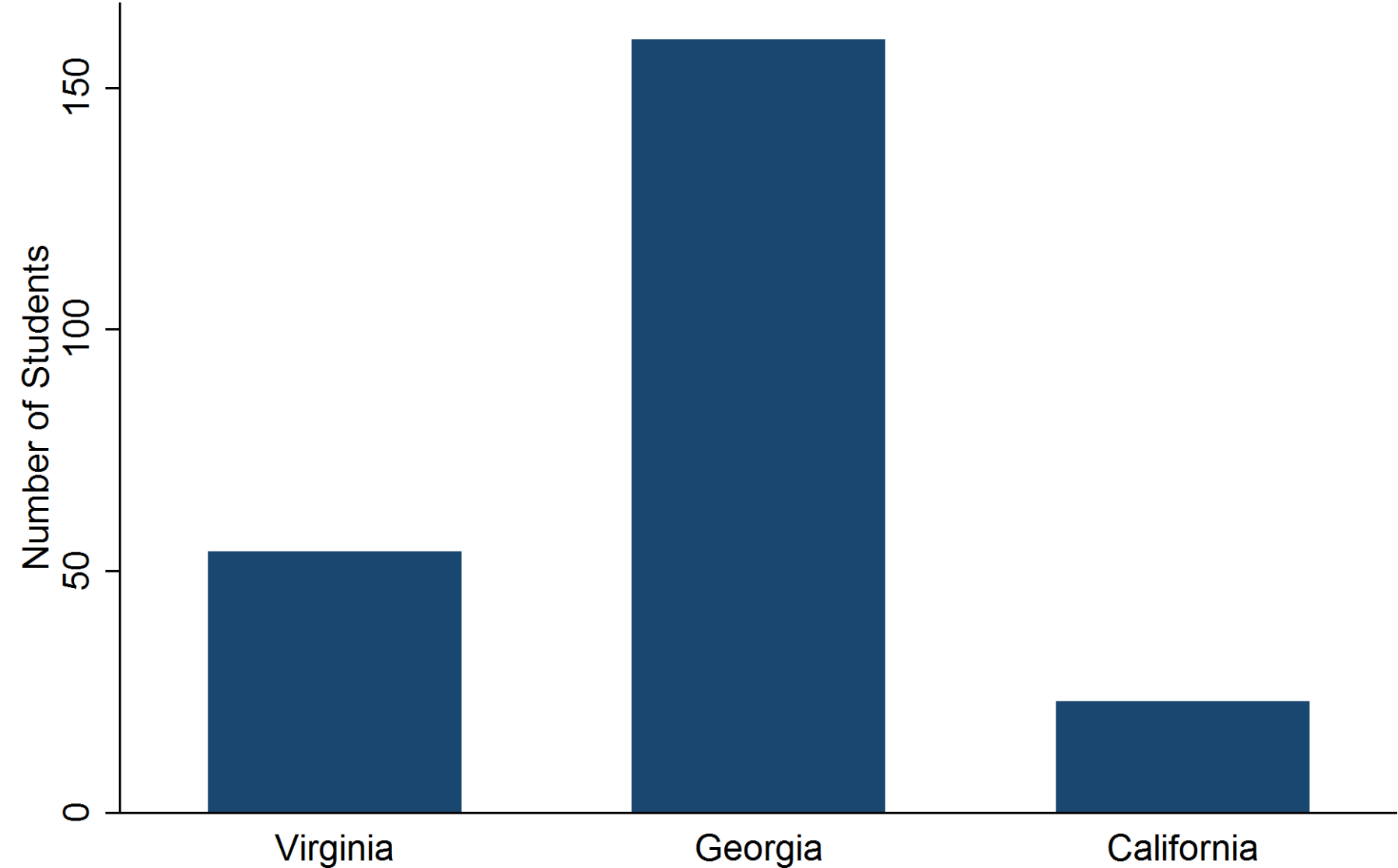

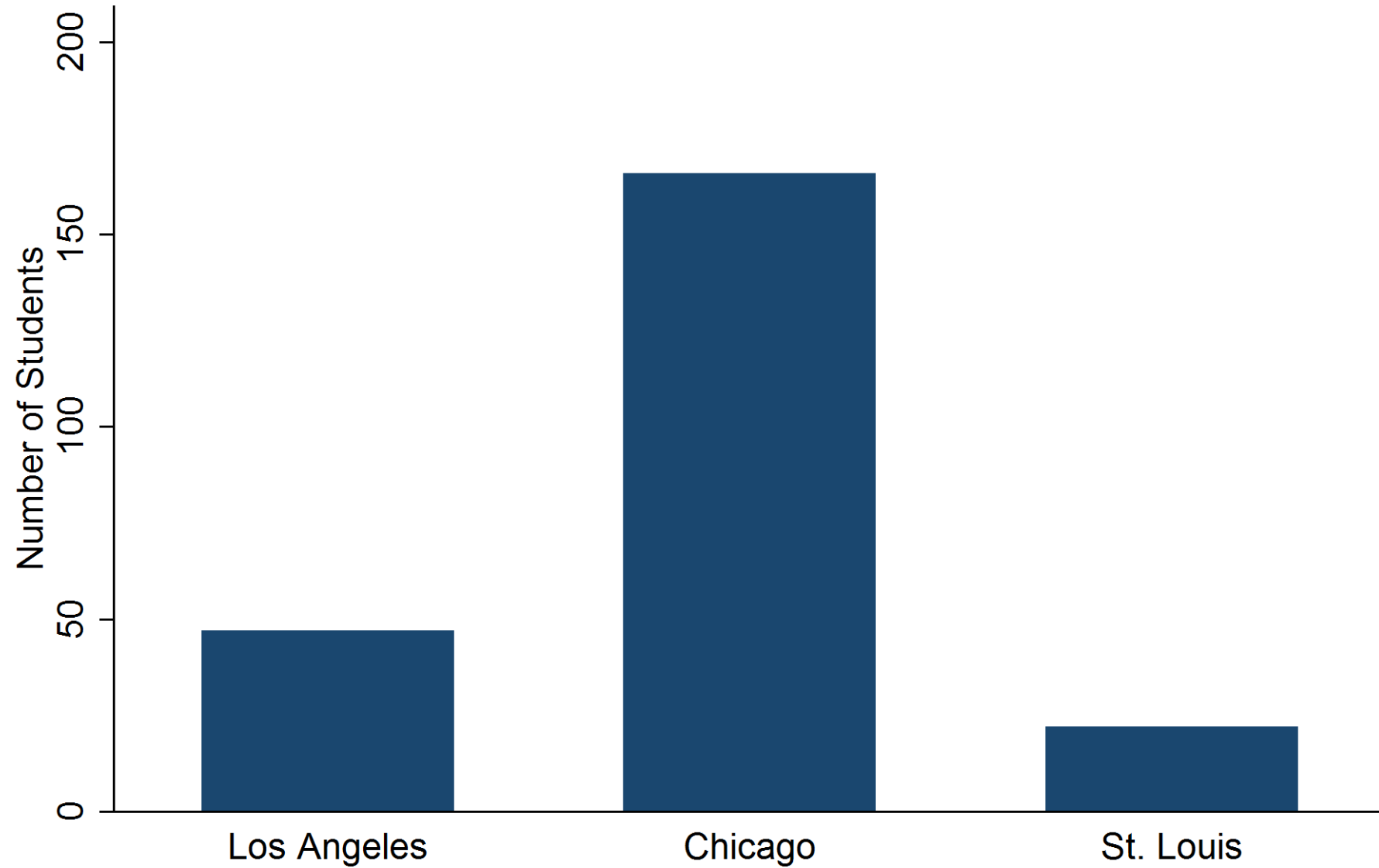

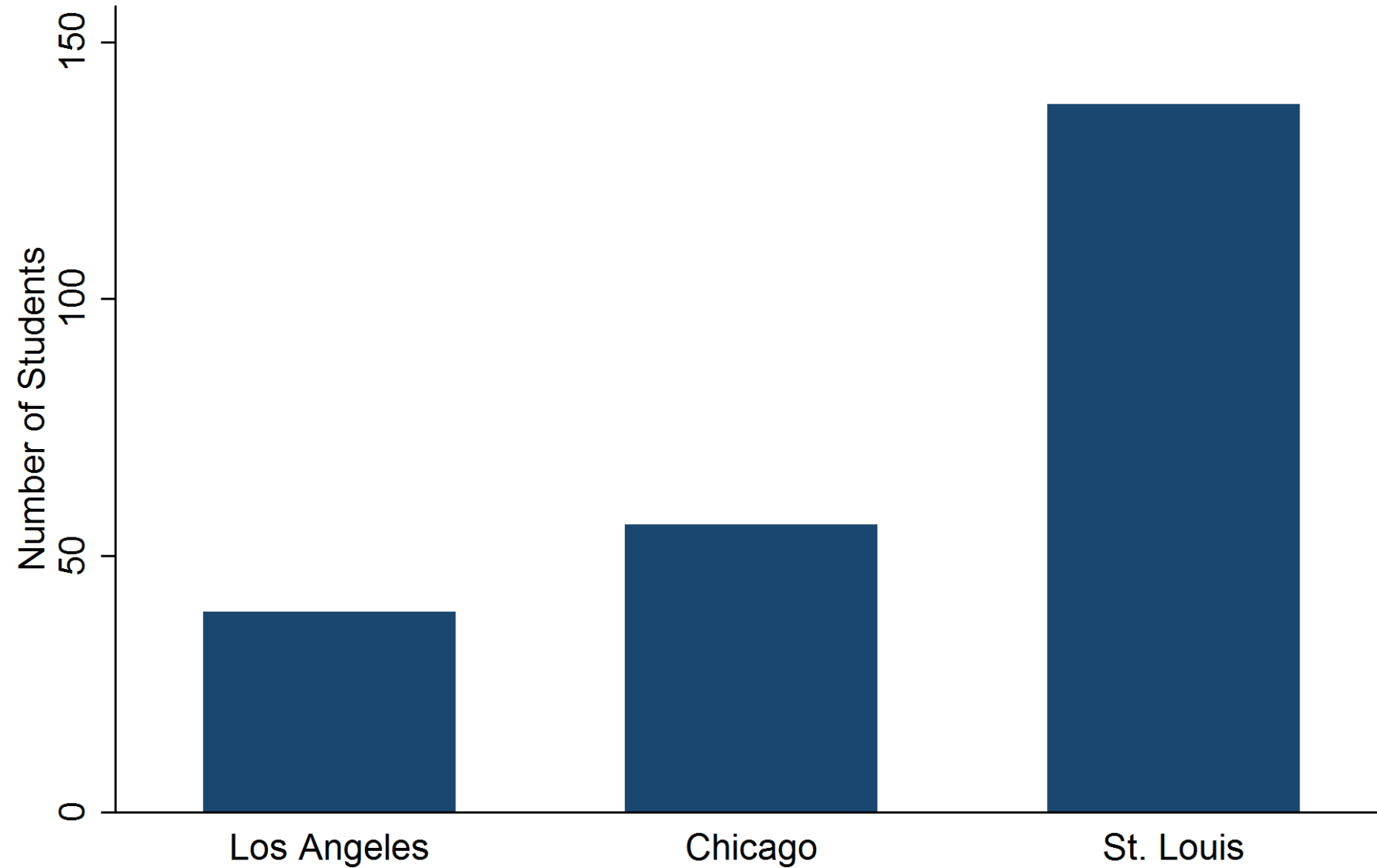

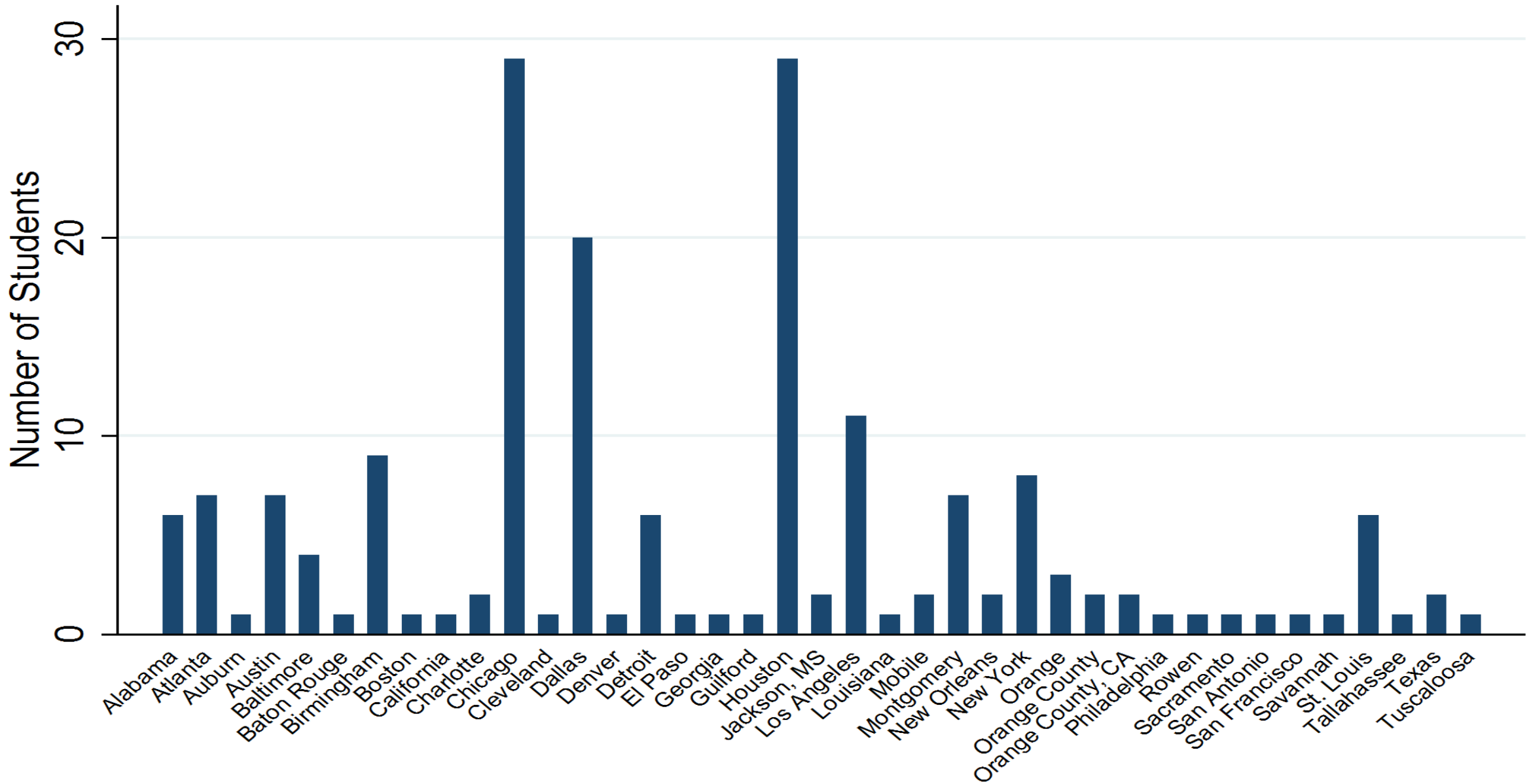

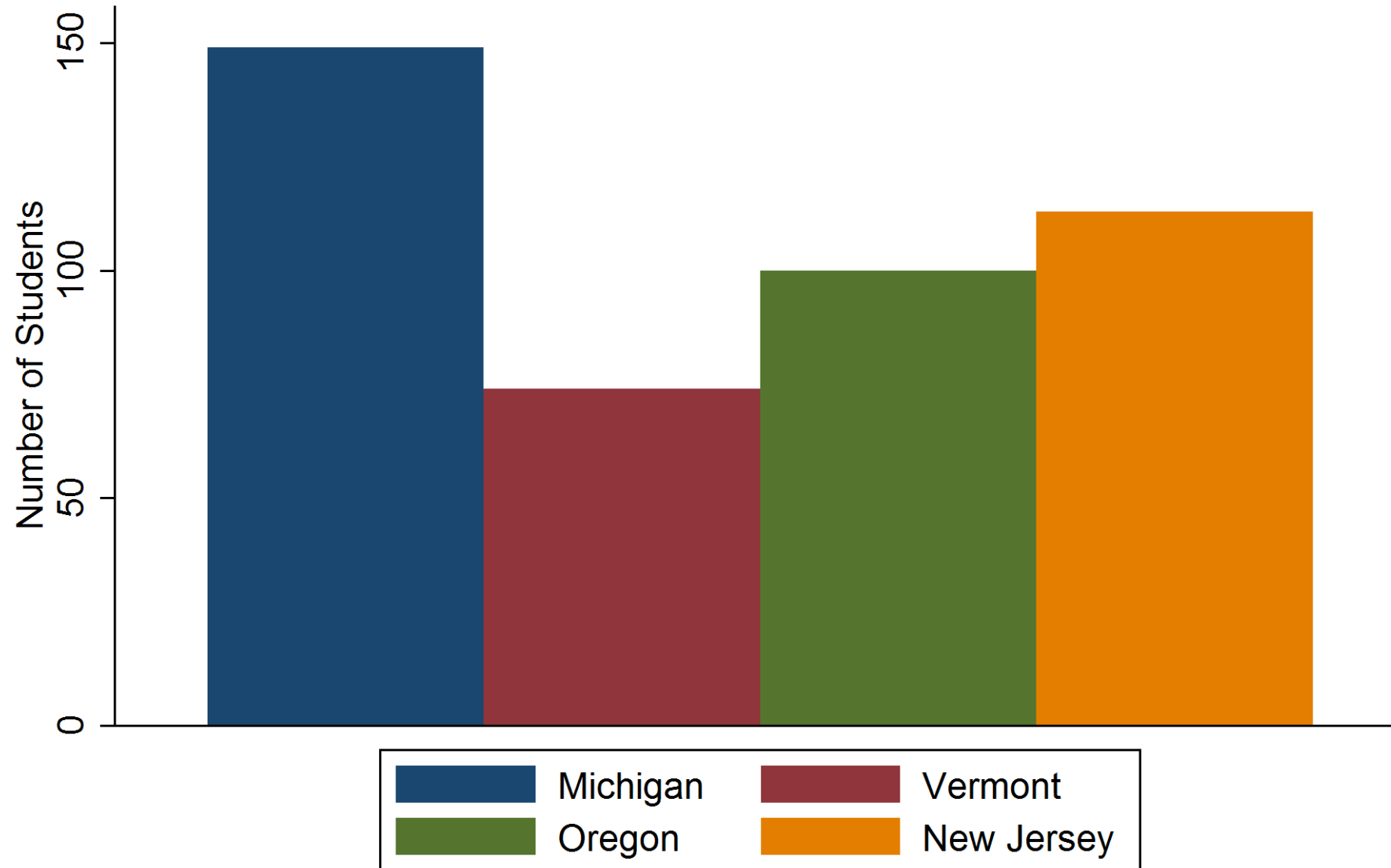

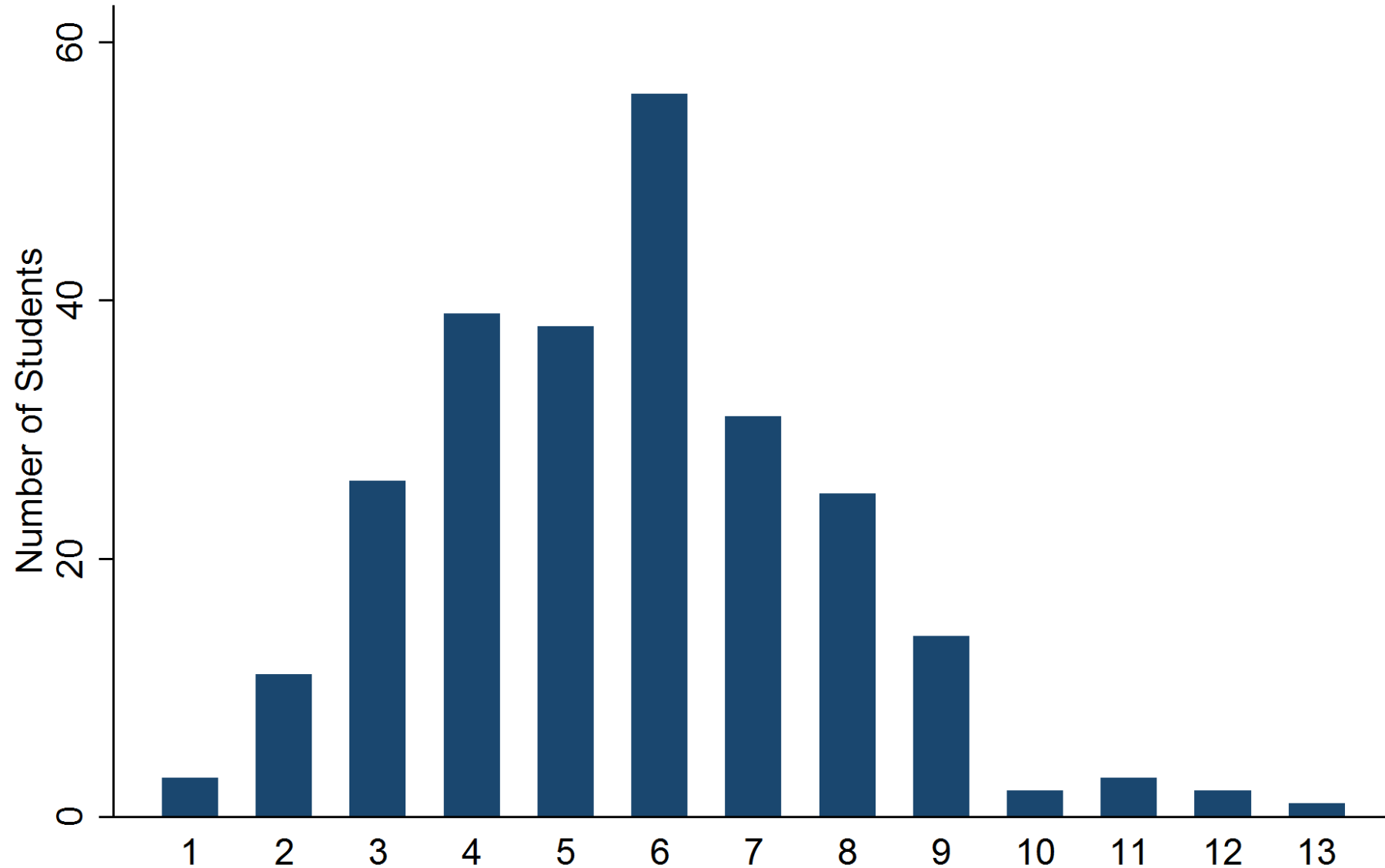
Q25: Currently Has Death Penalty

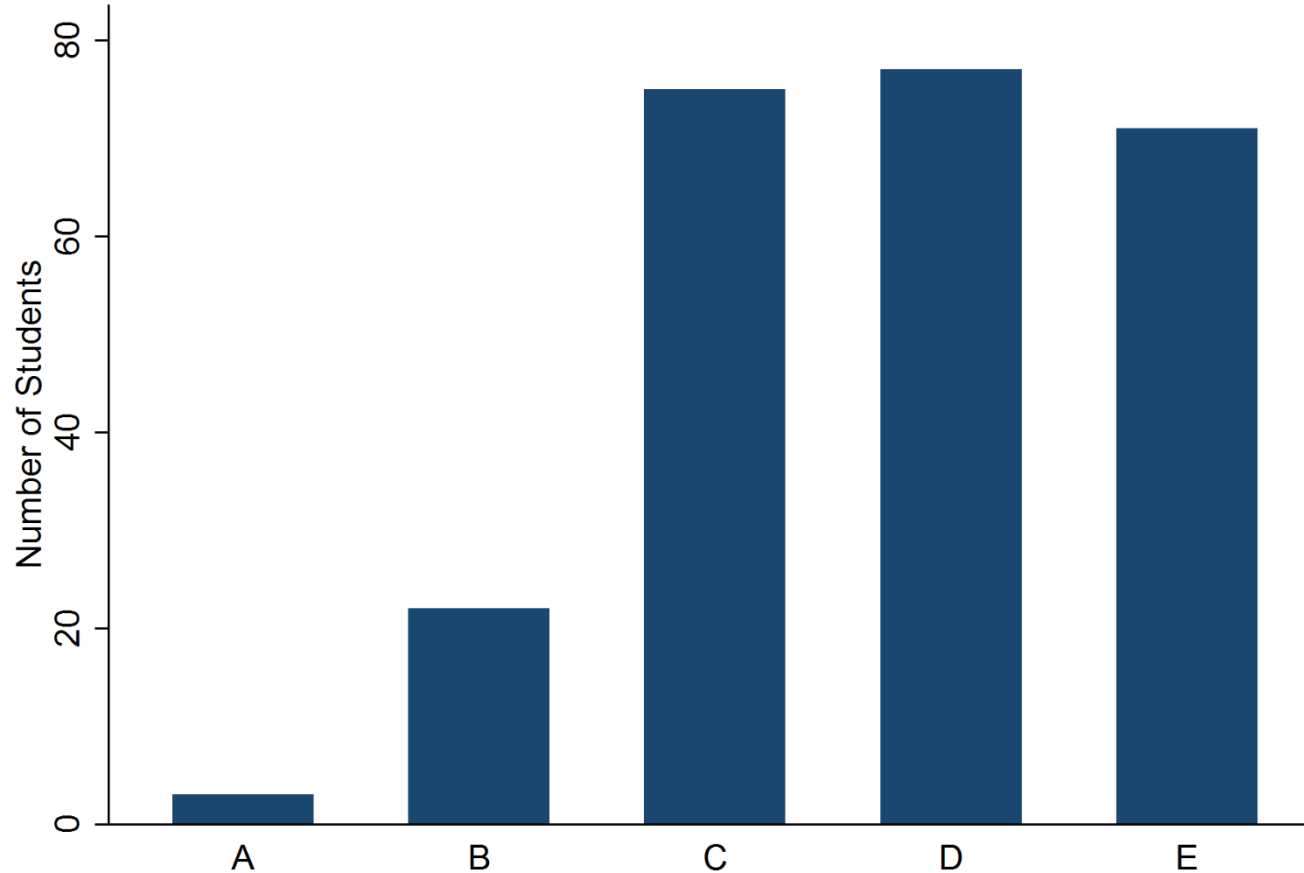
Distribution of Quiz Scores (out of 25)

- e. The death penalty is morally wrong and should never be used in any circumstances.

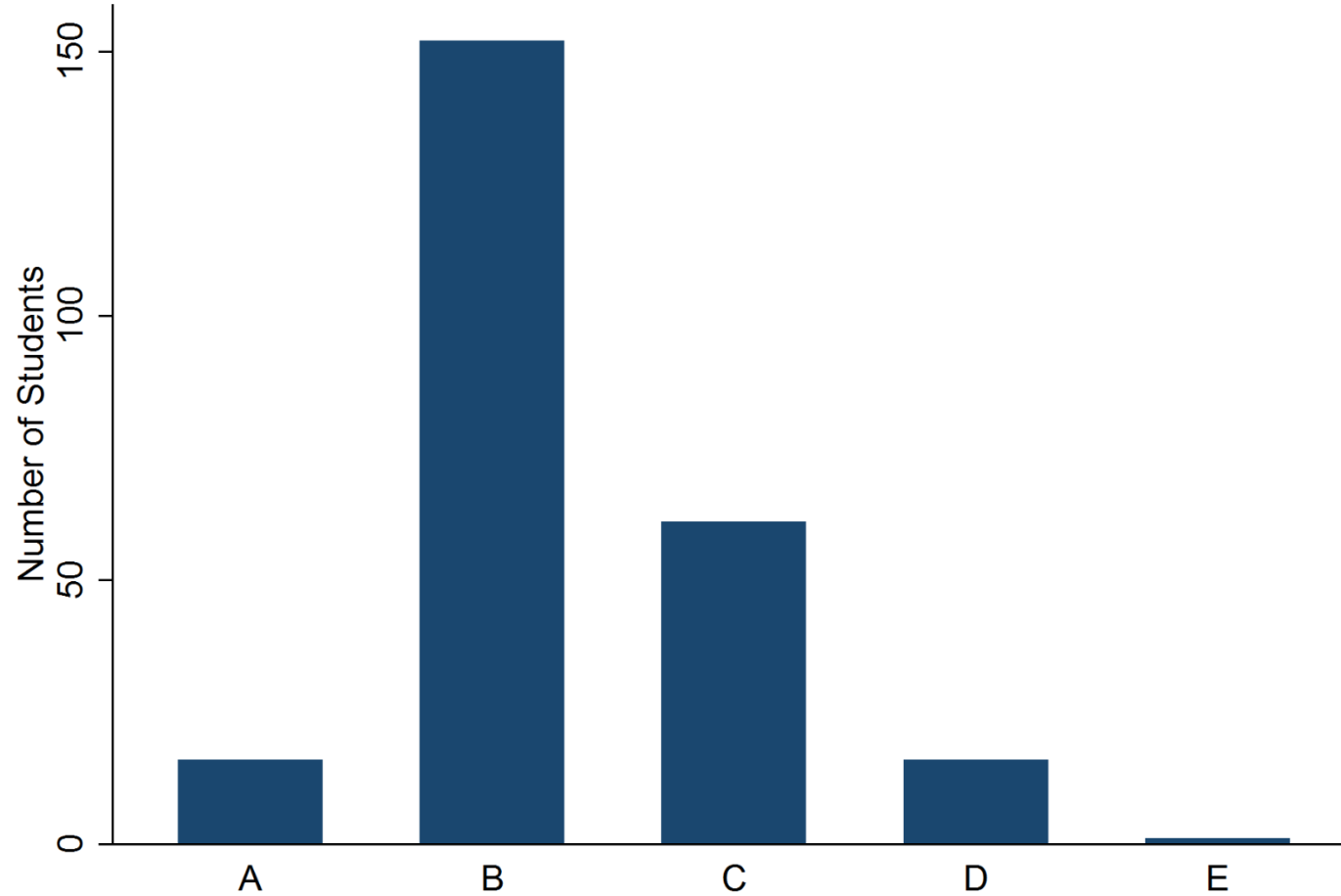

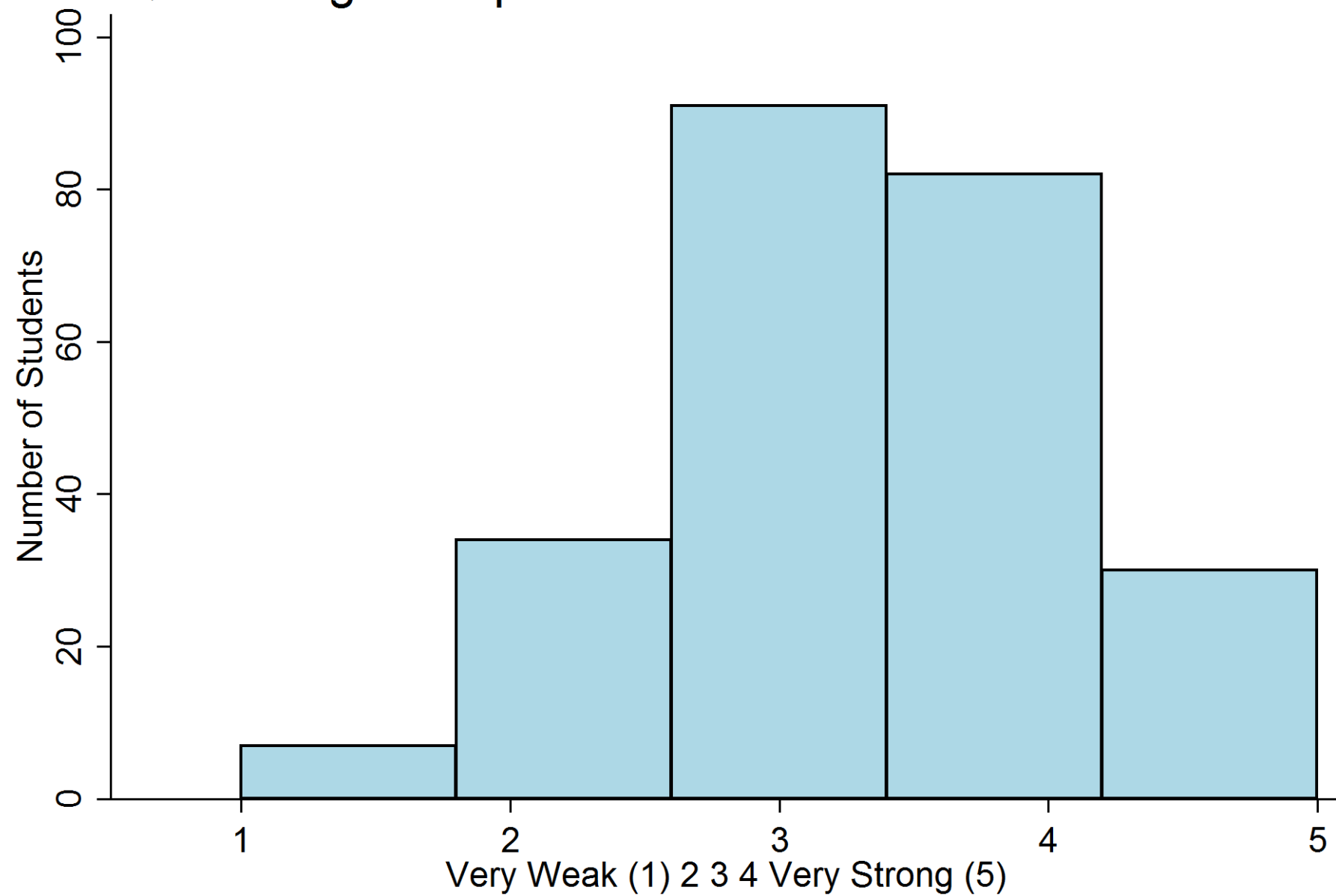


Q5: Knowledge of Death Penalty

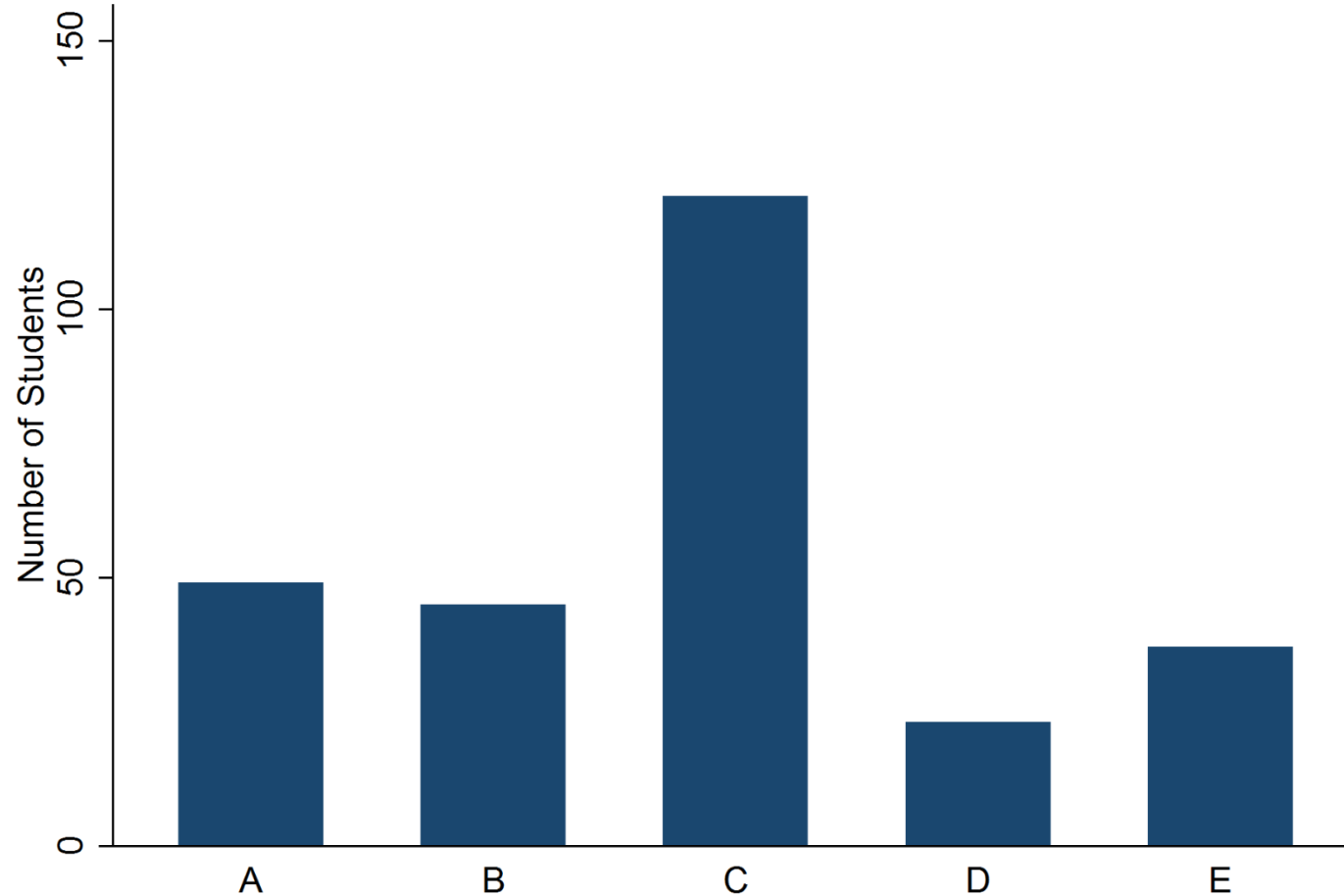


- a. I really have to admit I don't know much about it. In fact, I have never really thought much about it.
